BOTHWELL.

A town in the Township of Zone, on the line of the Great Western Railway; distant from Chatham 26 miles, from London 40 miles, and from Windsor 70 miles. It was laid out in 1855, but its settlement dates from 1858, at which time it contained one store and two saw mills. The Hon. George Brown was the original proprietor of the site, which was disposed of in 1856. The Bothwell Land and Petroleum Company, or "Scotch Company," purchased 5,250 acres lying round and in the town. This purchase gave the first great impetus to oil operations in this section. The company is under the management of A. R. Pratt, Esq.

Bothwell was incorporated as a town by special Act of Parliament in 1865. Population in 1866 reached nearly 6,500.

The town of Bothwell is indebted to its apparently inexhaustible mineral wealth for its prosperity. On the first discovery of
