Now Notifiable Diseases

Ontario Follows the Line of the British Authorities

By an order-in-Council Doctor McCullough, Provincial Medical Health Officer announces that the diseases typhus and malarial fever, influenza, acute influenza pneumonia, acute primary pneumonia and dysentery (both amoebic and bacillary) have been made notifiable in Ontario. While some of these diseases do not exist in Ontario as a rule the province is following Great Britain in having them made notifiable for the reason that they may be carried here by the returned soldier.

604 Varsity Men Dead Out of 5,400 Enlisted

Magazine Supplement Gives Big Idea of the Sacrifices Made and Honors Won.

Some idea of the sacrifices made and the honors gathered by the graduates and students of Toronto University in the war may be gathered from the fourth edition of the Varsity Magazine Supplement published by the Students' Administrative Council of the university.

Tributes to their fallen comrades are terse. There is no lavish layout of sentiment, and yet there are pages of photos of the men of Varsity who have attended their last lectures. At date of publication the casualties in dead are 694 of the total 5,400 students and graduates who enlisted.

The honors are many and include one V.C., 23 C.M.G.'s, 6 C.B.'s, 70 D.S.O.'s, 3 bars to D.S.O.'s, 215 M.C.'s, 14 Distinguished Service Crosses, 2 bars to D.S.C.'s, three Distinguished Flying Crosses, 11 D.C.M.'s, 26 M.M.'s, 1 Cross of the Legion of Honor, 4 officers of the Legion of Honor, 18 Croix de Guerre and 31 Belgian, Italian, Russian, Rumanian, American, other foreign and French academic decorations.

There have been also two awards of Royal Red Crosses to nurses who were students when the war broke out, 190 mentioned in despatches, and 82 mentioned for valuable services.

In "A Retrospect" by Sir Robert Falconer a fine exhortation is made to the people here at home to practise a co-operation in our trying period of reconstruction like that maintained by our Canadian Corps at the front during the war.

Garden Work Needed Again This Summer

Vacant Lot Cultivation Will Be Required to Normalize Food Conditions

Ottawa, April 5.—The enthusiastic spirit which animated the movement for home garden and vacant lot cultivation last year, and which was an important factor in keeping down the cost of living, will be as necessary in the coming year of reconstruction, says an announcement from the Canada Food Board. All indications are that similar garden work will be required to normalize food conditions.

A Chance to Celebrate

The Hamilton Herald recently pointed out the while Hamilton sent men enough overseas to form several battalions, no Hamilton battalion went to France as a unit. It is, therefore impossible to welcome home a distinctive Hamilton battalion, but when all the Hamilton soldiers are home there should be, says the Herald, a grand parade and review in which all would take part.

There are many other towns and cities in the same position as Hamilton. Many towns have sent enough men overseas from their respective districts to form at least a battalion, but no battalion will come marching back to them. No doubt every town and village would like to have a parade of its returned men after they are all back.

No Enemy Nations in Olympic Games

Paris, April 4.—The French Olympic Committee has voted unanimously to abide by the resolution passed by that organization in November 22, 1918, in which it and its affiliated bodies decided they would not participate in any Olympic in which citizens of enemy nations would compete. The committee suggests that the Olympic games should not be held before 1921, saying that sufficient time must be allowed for the organization of track and field athletics by nations which have been engaged in the war.

Ottawa, April 5.—Col. A. Hamlyn Todd, Chief Clerk of the Parliamentary Library, on Tuesday celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his entry into the employ of the Government.
