

CANADA'S CROPS WILL BREAK ALL RECORDS

Quality as Well as Quantity in Advance of Other Years

Satisfactory Reports Come From Every Part of the Dominion—Only Slight Setbacks in Various Provinces.

OTTAWA, Oct. 12.—The monthly bulletin of the census and statistics bureau, giving the condition of field crops throughout the Dominion at the end of September, shows that in quality as well as in quantity this year's harvest is of record breaking variety.

The reports of reliable correspondents in all sections of the Dominion show that as compared with the reports at the same date last year, the average quality of spring wheat is 75 to 75 per cent. of a standard of 84 to 75, of barley, 81 to 71, of rye, 75 to 75, of buckwheat, 75 to 75, of oats, 89 to 75, of flax, 86 to 82, of corn for husking, 87 to 82. In four months' time, the average quality of grain is produced, the crops of quality are uniformly high.

Compared with last year, spring wheat in Manitoba is 87 to 81 per cent. of a standard, oats 86 to 73, and barley to 82.

In Saskatchewan wheat is 89 to 84 to 87, and barley 81 to 88. In Alberta spring wheat is 89 to 84 to 84 and barley 84 to 82. The high qualities applied to a total put of 300,000,000 bushels at the present market price would result in a gain of a century are an indication of the country's fortune reaped from soil and the prairies this year. In the provinces where the grain is westward the records of grain crops are satisfactory.

Just the joint worm and bacteria did some injury in parts of the province. In the Annapolis Valley of Nova Scotia, heavy frosts brought the grain of New Brunswick to the stalk and early frost and grass hoppers have lowered the yield of oats and barley in Quebec. But the loss from these causes will not be serious.
