Thaw is Ready to Go; Expects Freedom Now

By Special Wire to the Courier.

New York, July 15—Harry K. Thaw, his sanity vindicated yesterday after an eight years struggle, contidently expects to be discharged from custody to-morrow. All his belong-ings in Ludlow street jail are packed up and Thaw is ready to leave on a moment's notice Justice Hendrick announced to-day

that he probably would hand down his decision at II o'clock to-morrow morning in the habeas corpus proceeding in which the jury trial was a part. In the preliminary to this decision, Abel I. Smith and Morgan J. O'Brien, of counsel for Thaw and Edgar Bromberger, deputy attorneygeneral, met in Justice Hendrick's chambers at 11 o'clock this morning 0 25 and agreed upon alternative orders, 0 20 one sending Thaw back to Matteam-0 22 to 0 00 an, the other setting aside the Dowling commitment and restoring him to liberty.

EXPECTS FREEDOM

These will be at hand to-morrow morning, and the justice will sign the order which is consonant with the decision he reaches. The general expectation is that Thaw will be restored to liberty.

"But I am not making any plans,' he said this afternoon. "However,' he continued cheerfully, "I will have a chance to finish the pinochle tournament up at the Ludlow street jail. It is quite exciting. I am a good second in a four-handed contest, with Van Schlecten and Levy and a fourth man whose name I am not going to mention because I don't believe his people know he is there."

Thaw is still bent on a motor trip to the San Francisco Exposition, QUESTION OF BAIL

Justice Hendrick said to-day that the question of bail for Thaw in the event of either side appealing from his decision is one for his discretion alone. But if bail was accepted Thaw would be at liberty to go where he pleased, the only injunction being imposed upon the bondsman being he produce Thaw when wanted. It is the general understanding that if he is set free the state will appeal. Bail in the sum of \$30,000, it is now said

Meanwhile a note of protest against


threats to Roumania is uttered by The Vorwaerts, which says: "Roumania remains firm in her re-

fusal to allow the transport of weapons and ammunition. Excitement over the matter is easily understood. On the free passage of transports between the central powers and Turkey depends the fate of the Dardanelles. That is the greatest danger which threatens the defenders and on the fate of the Dardanelles depends the fate of Constantinople. To-day this is the corner stone of politics carried on

by the central powers.

"Roumania's obstinate refusal is based on the determination not to allow the opportunity of the world's war to pass unused. As in the second Balkan war, it will now, with the least posible expenditure of money and blood obtain the highest profits. But firm opposition must be raised against the attempts in certain quarters here to beat down Roumania by the application of the principle of

Clausewitz. "As to other means of following up the recommendation of the policy, what words would the people of Germany use if England attempted to force Sweden to allow transports of ammunition and weapons, or even machines? But the same words would be of exact application if the central owers were to attack Roumania."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male

over 18 years old, may bomestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of it least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Presuption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per cre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and rect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to recommend. The area of cultivation is subject to re-luction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted fer cultivation under certain conditions.
