Taken Under Advisement By Judge

The Testimony in the Case Was Very Conflicting-Rogers Vs. Reed Now

From Wednesday's Daily) The trial of the case of James McKenzie and John Miles, plaintiffs, vs. Mrs. M: I. Davidson and J. L. Davidson, detendants, was concluded this morning. The action involves the title to an half interest in the hillside claim, left limit, opposite the lower half of No. 3, Magnet gulch. The plaintiffs centend that at their instance the property was staked and recorded by defendant, Mrs. Davidson; and that in consideration for the information which they imparted to her, she agreed to deed to them an half interest in the ground. Defendant, Mrs. Davidson, denies the allegations respecting the agreement, and declines to convey any interest in the property, which has been developed into an exceedingly rich claim. The case has been closely stested in the territorial court for the

The testimony of the parties to the ion and of the several witnesses who have been introduced has been very conflicting; indeed, a portion of the evi-dence is of such an extremely contrary and, the charge being sustained, a fine dence is of such an extremely contrary nature that it cannot be reconciled on any reasonable hypothesis, and the fact is parpable that some of the witnesses have resorted to perjury.

This morning the attorneys submitted their respective arguments; and Justice Dugas has taken the case under advisement. Pending the decision of the court, the plaintiffs have applied for the ppointment of a receiver to take charge of the property in litigation. This mo-tion will be determined by the justice within the next few days.

The case of Charles S. Rogers, plaintiff, vs. Alfred S. Reed, defendant, is now on trial. The plaintff is attempting to recover about \$400, which sum he alleges to have been overcharged by the defendant for the transportation last summer of certain goods from Honey to Dawson. The action will occupy the remainder of the day.

A decision has been rendered in the case of Mazada, plantiff, vs. Delphel, defendant. The defense of the defendant has been struck out, and judgment has been entered in favor of the plain tiff for the amount claimed and costs.


