NO ONE TO BLAME

For the Death of Jesse Merriam Says the Coroner's Jury.

The inquest on Jesse Merriam was continued and concluded before Coroner Bray in the old town hall last evening.

John Ladell, conductor L. E. & D. R. R., Ridgeway, was on duty on special at time of accident. About 12:15 p. m., Aug. 18th, about 18 miles from Ridgeway, Engineer stopped train in four coach lengths. Merriam was lying on his side on ground eight to ten feet north side of track. He never spoke. Witness sent for doctor and sent Merriam to Chatham.

Edgar Sackville, driver, saw deceased sitting on rail, applied air-brakes and reversed engine immediately.

Stewart Eastlake, brakeman, corroborated last witness.

From Wm. Sedgwick, brakeman, nothing material was elicited.

Dr. McKenough testified that death resulted from a fracture of the skull and other injuries due to a very severe blow, and Dr. Holmes described the treatment of the boy at the hospital. His death was inevitable in any case.

The jury found that deceased died on 18th inst. from injuries received while asleep on rails, on 15th, from collision with train on L. E. & D. R. R., and no blame be attached to any other party in connection with the accident. Also that railway officials made every effort to stop train.
