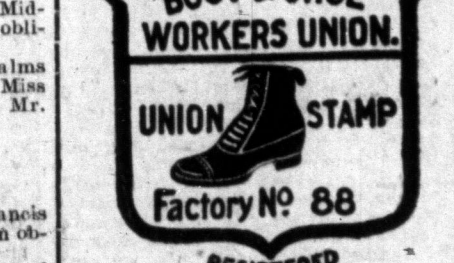
Divine service will be held in the Latter Day Saints' Hall, King St., at 7 p. m. to-morrow, by Elder B. St. John, a missionary.
