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### TWO FIRES AT WELLAND

Road Roller Bursts Gas Main Causing Bad Explosion.

Firebox Ignites Escaping Gas-Flames Leap Eighty Feet With Terrific Roar-Engineer Horribly Burned-Methodist Church Destroyed-Fire-man Badby Hurt by Falling Cor-nice-Loss Estimated at \$15,000.

Welland, Aug. 7.—An unusual acci-ent occurred yesterday afternoon st .30 when the town's heavy road reli-r burst a gas main, an eight-inch ipe lessing from the Crowland gas

pipe leading from the Crowland gas fields.

The gas ignited from the firebox of the roller, and the roar of the fiames, which reached eighty feet in the sir, could be heard for miles. William Phillips, the engineer, was blown from the cab of the relier and horribly burned. He was taken to a nearby house, and it was found that the flesh was coming from his hands, his face was seared and all his hair removed from his head. The machine, which cost \$3,500, is a total wreek.

Nothing could be dosse to put out the fire until the gas was turned off an hour later at Air Lime, three miles distant. The town was out off from a gas supply last night.

At 7 eclock the Methodist Church burst into fiames, presumably from a spark from the burning cab of the road roller. The town firemen and the brigade from the Plymouth Cordage Co. could do mothing to check the fire, and the whole building was consumed. The loss is \$15,000. It was the finest church property in Welkand. The insurance is \$5,000. The church took fire two months age and had been under repairs to the extent of \$2,000. A pipe organ had just been installed, and the reopening services were held only last Sunday with sermons by the Rev. Dr. A. L. Gee of Brantford, president of the Hamilton conference, and a former pastor here.



B. N. A. Act Amended.
London, Aug. 7.—(C.A.P.)—The bill to amend the British North America Act in relation to provincial subsidies as finally amended, has passed the House of Commons.

There appears to have been some difficulty over the bill. The Imperial authorities omitted from their draft all reference to the "final and unalterable" feature of the scheme. This created the impression that it was the intention of the British Government to leave the matter open to further agitation by the provinces, particularly by British Columbia.

The Canadian ministers in England strongly objected to the bill in this form, and in consequence of their representations respecting the necessity for the recognition of the "final and unalterable" purpose of the arrangement the whole address of the Canadian Parliament, including the words in question, was made part of the bill in the form of a schedule.
