

## WHITE FANS LEAD RIOT

Alleged False

Amoy, China, June 3.—The centre of the present Chinese uprising is at Juan, 50 miles southwest of Amoy. The officials there arrested the leaders of an organisation known as the White Fans, charging them falsely with being pirates. The prisoners escaped, collected their followers, killed the prefect and other officials and held the local magistrate as a hostage.

Emboldened by this success, 30,000 rebels gathered and threatened Chaochowfu. Troops were hurried from Canton and Fuchow, and engaged the rebels Saturday between Swatow and Amoy, with the result that, 600 of the latter were killed. The Government loss is not known. The rebels withdrew, but were not dispersed, and are rapidly recruiting their forces.

But the star case this morning was that of Humane Officer James Mc-Gregor vs. Alexander Eady, in which the former was accused of being aparty to the ill-treatment of a horsehorse belonging to Liveryman George Lamperd. Crown Attorney H. D. Smith prosecuted, and City Solicitor O. L. Lewis appeared for the defense. Both legal lights were on their mettle this morning, and they had several lively passages-at-

they had several lively passages at-arms before the case was concluded. The witnesses called were, Livery-man Lamperd, Veterinary Surgeons Joseph Kime and Pringle, Fred. Johnson, and the defendant, Alexander Eady.

According to the Crown witnesses, it appears that a man named Edwards ordered the horse and rig at Lamperd's livery. He said he had been sent there by Eady, and that they were going to drive out to the 8th concession. Instead, they drove to Dresden, and did not get back till 1.10 the following morning. When they brought the horse back, it was in bad condition, and required the attention of two veterinary surgeons. It was sick for fifteen days afterwards, and the attendance cost Liveryman Lamperd about ten dol-
