COMING FOR DEAL.—Mr. J. L. Black has six barges chartered and on the voyage to this province to load deals—two to load at Sackville and four at Shediac.

ELECTION PETITIONS.—Mr. Wood M. P. has filed a petition against Mr. H. R. Emmerson asking for his disqualification. A second petition against Mr. Wood has been filed by Thomas Colwell.
NEW CHURCH.—Plans are being prepared for the R. C. Church at Bathurst which will be built this season to take the place of the one destroyed by lightning last summer. The building is to be of brick with granite trimmings.
SCIENCE.—James Horsman, a wealthy farmer who lived near Elgin, Albert Co., hanged himself in his barn last Thursday morning. He was over sixty years of age and had always been regarded as a worthy and reliable citizen.

Mapleton.

—Bad roads and cold weather too general for itemizing in any locality.
—Our Mapleton weather for the past week has had a damper upon our sugar making but warm sunshine will put all things right.
—Thus far we have hardly had our average amount of sap. Some parties have made 1000 lbs of sugar, but 500 lbs. has been about the average.
—The Athol industry has been getting sleepers for the L. C. R., in which nearly all the labouring men have been engaged, giving employment and thereby providing for a number of families during this long hard winter. The prices have been fairly remunerative, and large quantities are now at Athol Station awaiting shipment.

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—The remains of J. Smith DeLany, who died at East Somerville, Mass., on Wednesday, were brought here for interment and the funeral took place on Sunday afternoon.

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Wallace.

—The merchants of Wallace are displaying a large quantity and extra quality of spring goods. The prices are reasonable and residents and little inducement to trade outside their own village.
—Mr. Dae, McDonald who returned from California last spring, and during the summer married one of the fair daughters of Wallace, expects, much to the regret of his many friends, to return shortly to that land of sunshine and perpetual summer.
—The community was shocked on Friday last by the intelligence of the death, at Charlottetown, of J. D. Munroe, late proprietor of the Wallace Hotel. He left home a week previous to his death. His friends met the remains at Picton and brought them to Wallace on Sunday morning. He was buried on Tuesday.

Sand River.

Sand River is one of the most pleasantly situated villages on this side of the Bay of Fundy. It has a frontage of about eight miles on the shore and is backed up by an almost inexhaustible forest of timber, with a graceful slope to the harbour, on either side, and is considered one of the best timbering places on this shore. Mr. E. J. White will ship this season about sixty cargoes of piling, some three or four cargoes of spars and piece sticks and will ship about two million feet of sawed timber. Several cargoes of piling have been shipped this spring and two vessels are now loading. A very busy time is anticipated here this summer.
I noticed in your issue of April 14th an account of a moose being chased out of the woods here on Sunday. Now Sir, "Pierce Stick," as he signs himself, is labouring under a great mistake. No such thing ever happened in Sand River, nor is it likely ever will happen, for it is the people of Sand River who are to be God fearing, conscientious, law abiding citizens, and I think a moose would be quite safe to travel through the place on Sunday. They have religious services at Sand River every Sunday. The Methodists and Baptists have preaching here, and they have a very nice Sunday School and prayer meeting which are ably conducted by John C. Reeves. There are some fine buildings at Sand River, and among them is the nicest School house in the county that I have seen. Its walls and ceiling have been beautifully decorated by the celebrated painter, E. J. Potter, of Advocate Harbour, and it with some of the other buildings here is the picture of neatness.

Moncton.

The following is a description of the apparatus of a short distance telegraph which has been successfully used in various places. The following materials are required: Two Transmitters, Each disk 12 in. diameter, clear pine, centre cut with circular saw to 7 in. diameter. On one side of each disk 5 thick brass rods, each 1/2 in. diameter, spaced evenly around the edge. On the opposite side fasten two thicknesses of above paper, making a hole in centre of 3 in. diameter through centre of first mentioned side piece a hole just large enough to take the wire, which should be "thickness of a knitting needle" and of copper. Make fast by wrapping end of wire round a nail on inside of drum. Wire is carried by running out arms from drum over posts or trees. From end of each post a loop of white cotton twine, in which wire hangs, free from obstruction. To keep transmitter from side of house use four blocks of wood or cotton spools making fast through them to wall. Hole for wire through wall must be made large enough to allow of wire passing through free. Make fast other end of line round nail inside transmitter. To summon either end of line tap at other end with piece of wood on the line. Has been in use successfully over 3/4 of a mile.

HALIFAX, April 28th.—Legislature met fourteen hours yesterday and adopted resolutions embodying government suspended secession policy until we can make the Dominion Government, also unanimously denounced harsh and objectionable coercion measure now before Imperial Parliament and expressed a hope that Home Rule would soon be given Ireland as best serving interest of British Empire.
Sir William Young laid the foundation stone of the new Dalhousie college yesterday. Convocation took place at the Academy of Music. Degrees were conferred upon sixteen. Three ladies won the degree of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Letters and first rank honors. Alderman O'Mullen was elected mayor yesterday, polling a majority of votes as his opponents combined.
St. John, April 28.—At the meeting of shareholders of Maritime Bank, the resolution of the bank's liabilities and assets was read and Mr. McLaughlin made full confession of how the bank was wrecked by accounts of the Stewarts, Guy, Bevan & Co. and Geo.
