

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Papers in Connection With Eastern Extension Railway Award Brought Down.

THE CHIGNECTO SHIP RAILWAY.

OTTAWA, April 25.—In the house today papers in connection with the Eastern Extension railway award were brought down by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Hon. Mr. Fisher introduced a bill to amend the Animal Contagious Disease Act.

Mr. Loy (liberal of Beauharnois), read affidavits contradicting allegations made by Mr. Monk in connection with the Valleyfield strike.

Mr. Monk promised to bring in an affidavit to show that he was right. He asked the government to appoint a commissioner to enquire into the matter.

The geological survey estimates were passed. Hon. Mr. Sifton, in answer to Mr. Lariviere, said that the programme of the geological surveys this season would be: Professor Bailey will continue his work in the southwest portion of (New Brunswick); Dr. Hugh Fletcher, with Mr. McLeod and A. McKinnon, will be engaged in Annapolis, Kings and Cumberland counties, N. S.; Dr. G. Matthews will collect fossils at Bras d'Or, while E. R. Fairbairn will survey in Halifax, Lunenburg and Kings counties.

Consideration of the militia estimates followed. A system was advocated by which the rifles should be allowed to remain in the hands of the men for practice. The minister of militia stated that ten rifles would be provided for each company.

Mr. Fowler, of Kings, N. B., wants storekeepers appointed who can be trusted, so that all men can have the use of their rifles.

The main estimates for militia were concluded.

The labor estimates brought from Mr. Ingram a severe condemnation of O'Donohue, the fair day's pay commissioner, who is acting as a Grit organizer in Ontario.

In reply to Mr. Robinson of Northumberland, Hon. Mr. Blair stated that the government had received addresses from New Brunswick boards of trade, Fredericton and Chatham, and the Fredericton city council, urging the government to acquire the Canada Eastern railway. The government has the proposal under consideration.

Mr. Gauvreau was told that a French Canadian would be appointed commissioner for inquiries into accidents and injury to the property of farmers on the line of the Intercolonial railway.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in reply to Mr. Taylor, said that the government had received a number of communications asking them to enact legislation to further restrict the liquor traffic. The matter was under consideration.

After dinner the debate on the item of \$50,000 for the labor bureau was resumed. The money will be largely used for issuing the Labor Gazette and paying salaries.

Mr. Borden of Halifax demanded that it should be unbiased, and that party heeler should not be employed as correspondents.

Mr. Provand, representative of the Chignecto ship railway, addressed the meeting of the members of the commons tonight in support of his claim that the government should grant relief to the shareholders, who have expended \$4,000,000 in good faith.

The customs estimates were next brought on, and items for the maritime provinces passed without comment. An increase of \$44,000 for the preventive service caused considerable discussion. Mr. Wallace declared that the increases were being made by leaps and bounds, and that a halt should be called.

In view of the attempt made in Montreal to buy up the prospective pay of the census enumerators, instructions were sent out to-night to the effect that all cheques would be made payable to enumerators in person.

Notice was given to-night that Hon. Mr. Sifton will introduce a government measure embodying the agreement signed by the Crow's Nest Coal Company not to discriminate against Canadians when the Crow's Nest Railway Company's bill comes in force. This clinches Blair's defeat by Tarte.

Hon. Mr. Paterson explained that the increase was to provide for the customs statistical branch.

The Senate.

OTTAWA, April 25.—In the senate Hon. Mr. Landry called attention to the complaints of Captain Winter against the Oliver equipment. He asked if the government intended to discontinue the issue of these accoutrements to the militia. He claimed that the imperial government had condemned the equipment at Halifax.

Hon. Mr. Mills replied that he knew of no such condemnation, and he did not think it would be abandoned. The senate again went into committee on the bill to amend the act respecting the safety of ships, and Hon. Mr. Mills amended the bill so as to provide for the shipment of cattle. He also added a clause providing that in case of danger the captain might place goods upon deck.

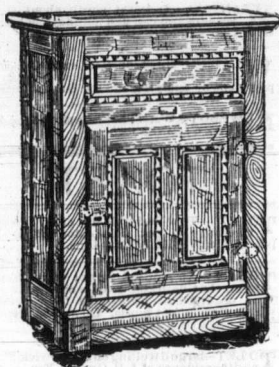
An Expensive Freshet
