

indifferent riflemen. Four good shots from the Sussex regiment repeatedly silenced one of the Mahdi's Krupp guns. During the darkness the steamers slipped past the beleaguered camp and arrived within sixty miles of the fort when one of them grounded. The second steamer, twenty miles further down, where Col. Wilson and the Sussex detachment still remain. Col. Wortley with three English soldiers and a party of natives, in a boat reached the fort at 3 o'clock this morning, Feb. 6. Sir Chas. Boreford's steamer with twenty picked marksmen from the Royal Rifles, started this afternoon to attempt to relieve them during the night. All of Col. Wilson's stores, guns and ammunition are in deep water and beyond recovery. No lives were lost by wrecking of the steamers. Col. Wilson's party have entrenched themselves on a sandy island. The steamers while going up the river traveled principally by night to avoid the exceedingly hot fire, which ceased when a man advanced with a white flag bearing a letter from the Mahdi to English officials in which it was stated that Khartoum had been captured without the firing of a shot. The city and Gen. Gordon are now in the Mahdi's hands. Col. Wilson has ascertained that Khartoum fell on the night of January 27. Faraz Pasha and other Egyptian commanders entered into secret negotiations with the Mahdi to get all the Egyptian troops on one side of the city. While one detachment would attack the boats another would open a land way. On the third day of the journey up the river natives shouted from the bank to Col. Wilson that Khartoum had fallen. The enemy were found well entrenched on the river bank. Five natives were present at the surrender of Khartoum. They declare that the rebels attacked the city of Khartoum, which remained at Khartoum took the Mahdi's troops to the main gate of the city where they were admitted under the darkness of night. Two of the natives declare that Gen. Gordon has been killed while the others are equally positive he took refuge in the fort. There is no doubt whatever that the main portion of Khartoum is occupied by rebels. Colonel Wortley saw them thronging the streets. Countless flags were flying and there were many signs of rejoicing. On the route down the river by the English steamers several of our men narrowly escaped capture. At the sixth cataract they were compelled to parley with the enemy under pretence of an intention to surrender.

A message has been received from El Mahdi stating that Gordon has become a Muslim and that all English officers had better follow his example. El Mahdi said he had no desire to fight the English, but unless they embraced the true faith he would not leave one in the Sudan.

A SERIOUS STATE OF AFFAIRS. London, Feb. 7.—Despatches from Korti received today indicate a very serious state of affairs at the British position near Metemneh. Lord Wolsey telegraphs to the War Office that a courier who has just arrived from Gubat reports Col. Boscawen, commander at that place, seriously ill, and that the Mahdi's forces are preparing to attack the British camp. The Arabs have several heavy guns which are being gradually moved up so as to bear on the British camp, and other field pieces are being maneuvered for the same purpose. The natives report that the Mahdi has 30,000 men scattered between Berber, Shendi and Metemneh, and that the force at the latter place is daily receiving reinforcements.

A despatch from Merawine says: The Black Watch and the Staffordshire regiments have passed Bahari Cataract. On their way they destroyed the houses of Suleiman, Waigara, who perpetrated the massacre of Col. Stewart and party. The rebels abandoned Shalook pass and much ammunition and grain was found there.

Before Col. Wilson gave up the attempt to reach Khartoum his little steamer sustained for four hours the fire of 7,000 riflemen, eight Krupp guns and eighty machine guns. The Arabs showed splendid discipline in handling the large guns. The water in the Nile is rapidly falling and navigation on the river and above Metemneh will soon become impracticable. The troops at Gubat are cheerful, but their officers exhibit much fretfulness and disappointment over the absence of reinforcements and of Lord Wolsey.

The Arabs deny that Gen. Gordon has been made a prisoner, and state that he was killed in action, having refused to give or take quarter. No trustworthy intelligence, however, has yet been received as to Gordon's fate.

The spy service, organized by Lord Wolsey and now directed by Col. Wilson, has misled the commander throughout.

A clergyman writes to the *Globe* a conversation he had some months ago with an Egyptian who was perfect under Arabi Bey's rule in Egypt. The Egyptian said Wolsey would never enter Khartoum. On no account would the Mahdi fight a decisive battle until the British were massed in the vicinity of Khartoum. Gordon, the prefect insisted, was already at the time of conversation, virtually a prisoner. His so-called defense of Khartoum was a mere form, as the Mahdi was not engaged in any attack upon the town because it was practically in his power, and he could take it whenever he pleased. The prophet's plan was to allow Wolsey's army to approach Khartoum, then enter the city, take possession and fight Wolsey from that great point of vantage. The prefect always insisted that Gordon would not be killed by El Mahdi.
