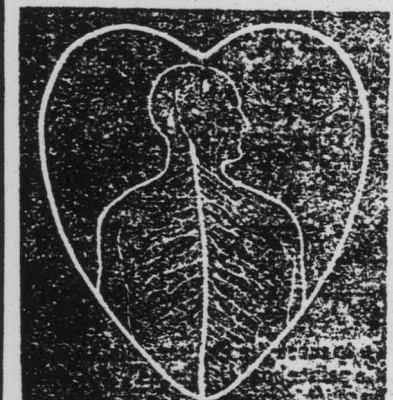

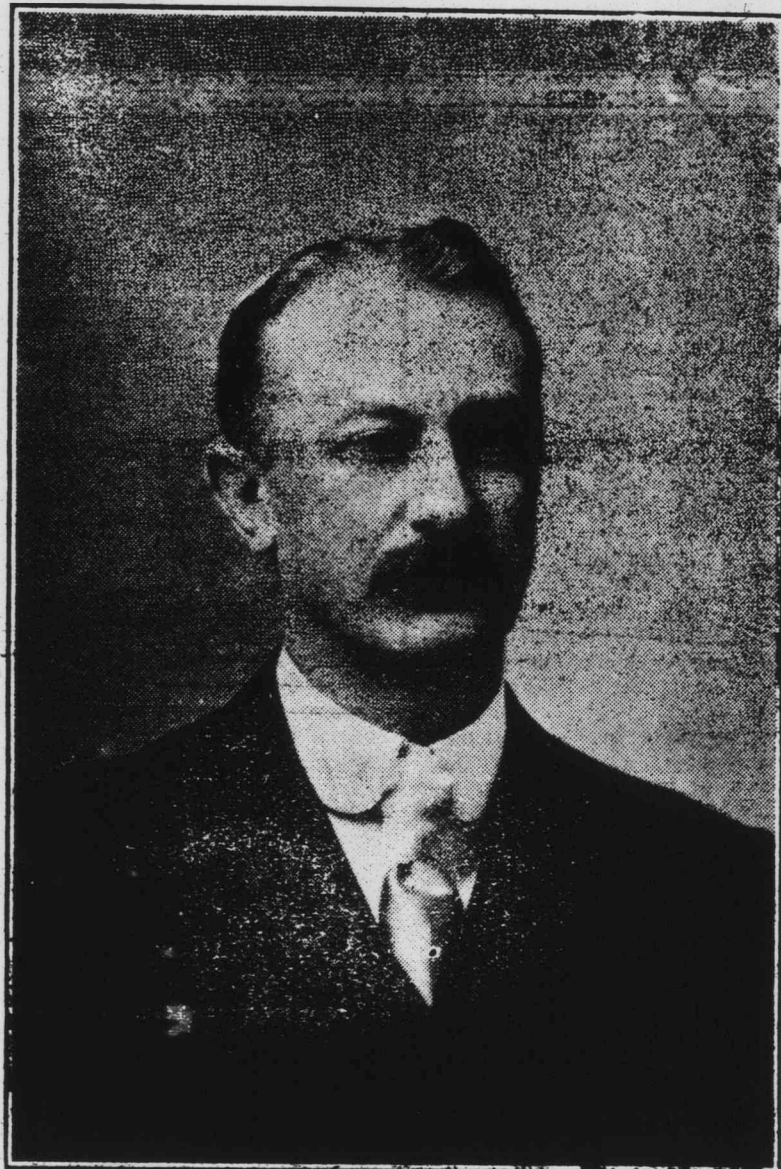

OPPOSITION LEADER OUTLINES POLICY

FREDERICTON, Friday. — Hon. Mr. Robinson, when the order of the day was called, said the gentlemen who had moved and seconded the address had referred to the fact that it was the first time they had had the experience of addressing the legislature. "They are not the only ones," said Mr. Robinson laughingly, "who are having new experiences." After congratulating the speaker on his selection to the high office and expressing the opinion that he would preside over the House with dignity and fairness, Mr. Robinson said the second of the address had avoided reference to matters of a controversial nature, but it was otherwise with the mover. The hon. member for St. John, referring to the value of the crown lands of the province, had said they were worth a quarter of a billion dollars, \$250,000,000. This was the statement as he had heard it. "On this side of the House," said Mr. Robinson, "we had a high appreciation of the value of the crown lands of New Brunswick, but the highest value of the crown lands government had placed upon them was \$20,000,000, and right here I might refer to the fact that the policy of the late government had been to conserve the crown lands of the country by preventing them passing into hands of speculators. I am therefore glad to have so strong an endorsement of the policy of the government of which I was leader from an opponent that they are worth so great a sum of money as stated by the mover of the address."

The Central Railway.
The mover of the address also referred to the Central Railway and said it had cost the people of the province \$1,250,000 and said that the government of the day was attempting to deprive the people when it stated that an offer to lease the railway at \$21,000 per annum represented three percent on a cost of \$700,000. There was no such attempt to show that at the time this statement was made that the cost of the Central Railway exceeded \$700,000 by more than a few thousand dollars, outside of the subsidies which have been paid towards all railways. The amount stated by the former speaker also includes amount of Dominion subsidies paid towards construction of this railway.
The late government is proud of its policy regarding the Central Railway. We have faith in the value of its income and in the fact that it was tapped by this railway. The interest on cost of the Fredericton bridge will be in the neighborhood of \$50,000 annually, yet this bridge serves for a comparatively small portion of the country, and the same may be said of other bridges. Who then under these circumstances, will expect that if even there is an interest curve of \$20,000 the price is too high to pay for the important development of the central areas of Quebec?

The Cold Storage Grants.
There has been nothing secret about this matter. Some years ago an act was placed on the statutes granting assistance towards the erection of a cold storage warehouse, but nothing was done until last year, when a company undertook the erection of the warehouse under the provisions of the act. The government guaranteed the bonds of the company for the \$50,000 and on the strength of that an additional \$20,000 had been added to the subsidy. This was not an unreasonable proposition, as the company had expended \$20,000 more than was provided for in the original contract. It was no new policy. What the government had done had frequently been done before by other governments. They only pledged themselves to place a bill before the legislature increasing the grant \$20,000. This was no ground for the insinuation of graft that had been made. On this question as on all others, we court the fullest investigation. It was unbecoming of any member to make such insinuations as had fallen from the hon. member from St. John. He should have made a direct charge which could be inquired into.

He did not think the references made by the member from St. John to Hon. Mr. Barnes were creditable. Mr. Barnes had never advocated Japanese immigration. Anyone hearing the hon. gentleman referring to what Mr. Barnes had said about the Japanese would think it was important matter and he made use of it to found a tirade against the whole Mongolian race. He (Mr. Robinson) had considerable respect for the Japanese. We might not feel it desirable to have them to assist in the development of the country, but as allies of the sovereign they should be treated with a certain amount of respect.
It was said by opposition speakers and the opposition press shortly after I took the office of premier that the credit of the province was so bad that we could not sell our bonds at any price. This statement was spread throughout the province in hysterical tones. The province had no large blocks of bonds to float. There was a small issue of 10 year bonds for the purchase of settlement lands from the N. B. Railway Company which the province had disposed of at \$64,000, while the present solicitor-general, a mayor of Fredericton was selling the bonds of that city at \$5. The credit of the province had always stood high and properly so.
I have always been an admirer of the present premier and am always willing to recognize merit in anyone, whether friend or opponent. I am, therefore, somewhat disappointed to find that the premier has departed from his policy laid down some years ago regarding the office of solicitor-general. He has been only a few days leader of the government, yet he has apparently forgotten all that he said some years since.
It used to be said by the leader of the opposition when on this side of the House that the speech from the throne was the same old story. Well, if that were so, the speech today copies to a large extent its predecessors, and might have been prepared by the same hand. The correspondence between the auditor-general and himself would show that he had the same view respecting the audit of the provincial accounts as is provided by the audit act. I am glad they are following out the policy we have mapped out in this and in other respects. Every one is convinced that changes were necessary in the highway act, and it was only a question of who could make them. The question of transportation is one of the most important with which we have to deal, but it might be said that the highway act was not wholly responsible for the bad roads of last year. The season was a wet one and had more to do with bad roads than the highway act. So far as school books were concerned that question was debated throughout the campaign and the government had appointed a committee to make careful inquiries into the cost of school books. It was learned that a series of worn out readers had been put on the market in Ontario at very low prices for 18 months. This was

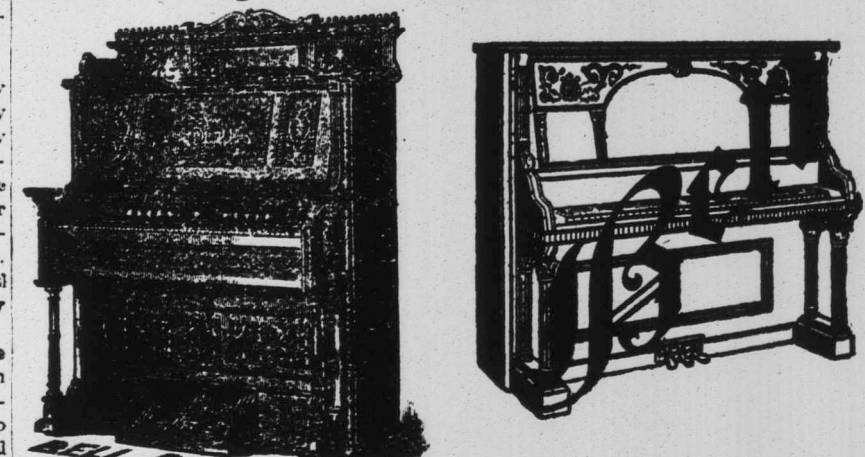
