scuers Still Busy-Believed That the Victims Number Between Forty and Fifty-Frenzied Women Surround the Mouth of the Pit.

Pittsburg, Dec. 3.—The bodies of wenty-five of the miners caught by an xplosion of fire damp on Sunday night the Naomi Mine of the United Coal o., located near Fayette City, Pa., 35 niles south of this city, had been reachd by rescuers at 4 o'clock this morning The bodies were burned and charred al-

most beyond recognition.

The rescuers are now nearing the end of the workings, and they have found no signs of life anywhere. In the opinion of the owners of the mine, few, if any, more victims will be found. Among miners and others in the village there is a firm belief that the total number of victims is between 40 and 50.

After finding eleven bodies near the 29th entry shortly before midnight, the rescuers went to work with renewed energy to explore the remaining seven most beyond recognition.

There are thirty-six entries in all, and antil the last of these has been searched the full extent of the disaster will not be known.

Because of the accumulation of gas, the work of rescue in the remote sections of the mine is greatly impeded. A second explosion is a constant menace, and every precaution is being taken to avert such a catastrophe.

Scores of frenzied women constantly surround the pit mouth, and the special detail of officers have much trouble in preventing them from interfering with the work of the rescuers.

The physicians present have been in almost constant requisition on behalf of the rescuers, who, despite the fact that they work in relays of only a fraction of an hour, are constantly being prostrated by the fumes of the gas. A number of the rescuers have been taken from the scene in a serious condition.
