Live Stock. Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the railways, were 590 calves, composed of 898 calves, 689 hogs, 283 sheep and lambs, 200 calves and three hogs.

There were some good lots of cattle, but many more of the common and half-fat.

Trade was not as brisk as last week, but prices held about steady, and had there been a heavy run it is altogether likely that there would have been a slump in prices.

Exporters—Few export cattle were on sale, but prices were quoted at \$4 to \$5.50 per cwt. for steers and \$4 to \$4.75 per cwt. for bulls.

Butchers—George Rowntree, who bought for the Harris Abattoir, eight carloads of cattle, quoted prices as follows: Loads of fat to good at \$18.50 to \$22.50; a few choice picked cattle at \$3.35 to \$5.70; medium butchers and good cows, \$4.25 to \$4 per cwt. to medium cows, \$3.00 to \$4 per cwt.

Feeders and Stockers—H. & W. Murray report having many orders on hand, but few cattle are being offered with which to fill them. One load of stockers, 600 lbs. each, sold at \$3.50 per cwt.

Silkens and Springers—A limited number of milkers and springers sold at \$20 to \$45 each.

Veal Calves—Receipts of veal calves, so called, were again liberal, the quality of the bulk being common to medium, as many of them were from dairy farms, judging from the breeds on sale. Prices ranged at from \$3 to \$6 per cwt., with an odd one here and there at \$5 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs—Taken altogether the quality of the sheep and yearling lambs was better than for some time, there being some of the best yearlings seen on the market this season. Export ewes sold at \$5 to \$5.50; rams, \$5.50 to \$12.50; yearling lambs of choice quality, \$8 to \$8.50 per cwt.; common, \$5 to \$6 per cwt.; spring lambs, \$3 to \$6 per cwt. The quality of the spring lambs was generally poor; many of them should have been left with the ewes for some time.

Hogs—Mr. Harris quoted \$0.40 for select and \$0.15 for lights.

Sugar Market. St. Lawrence sugars are quoted as follows:

HAS LITTLE CHANCE OF PASSING COUNCIL

(Continued from page 1.)

of the Fire and Water Committee, passed a resolution saying that they desired the territory to be annexed by the city and that they were willing to pay the city taxes and water rate as soon as the system was installed and water delivered. They asked that the present assessment stand for two years.

This practically settled the matter with the aid of the township council. The matter will go before the Railway Board which will be asked to make an order.

Mayor Stewart declared to-day that the resolution was unanimous and that although one man did not vote for it he was more interested in getting sewer accommodation. Of course if a sewer is built, it will be on the local improvement plan. The Mayor will ask Engineer Barrow to give an estimate of the cost of laying both the mains and sewer at the same time. He thinks a trench big enough for both could be dug more cheaply if the work was all done at once.

Aldermen Lewis and Hennessey, appeared before the Cemetery Board last night and asked the managers to pay half the cost of a cement walk from the chapel gate to the northern gate of the cemetery. They pointed out that it would not only be a convenience to people in the district, but to those who wanted to go from one cemetery to the other. The board will wait until it receives an estimate of the cost before deciding. The chapel will be kept open on Sunday and stormy days.

The statement for the first quarter showed receipts of \$6,531, of which \$2,689 goes to the perpetual care fund. The expenditure was \$1,578.

Secretary Brennan, of the Board of Works, this morning wrote to Engineer Sotherman, who is preparing plans for the proposed municipal lighting plant, asking him when he expected to be able to hand them over to the city. The city officials say it is very necessary they should have them at once before they begin repairing streets.
