

Latest Despatches.

LONDON, June 6.

The National Reform Union of Manchester, at a meeting held last night, adopted resolutions supporting the policy of the Government in the recent Alabama matters.

The Marquis of Londonderry addressed a public meeting at Bath and declared that the speech recently made by Mr. Disraeli at Manchester and the motion brought up by Earl Russell were the two obstructions to the amicable settlement of the difference with the United States.

The Duke of Edinburgh opened the exhibition at Dublin with very imposing ceremonies, in presence of an immense concourse.

A great inundation of the River Po has caused widespread desolation and terrible suffering. Immense tracts of the country around covered with water, and four hundred thousand people homeless.

Jan Rudolph Thorbeck, the eminent Statesmen and Minister of Holland, is dead.

NEW YORK, 6.

Rumours of the speedy withdrawal of Secretary Fish from the State Department were renewed in Washington yesterday.

At the National Republican Convention in Philadelphia to-day, President Grant was nominated for re-election, receiving the votes of every delegate present. Hon. Henry Wilson, of Massachusetts, was nominated for Vice-President, in the first ballot receiving 384 1-2 votes to 321 1-2 for Colfax. Both nominations were hailed with great enthusiasm.

The storm of Wednesday was very disastrous to shipping on the New England coast. The British schooner "Julia," Capt. Stephens, of St. George, Nova Scotia, was driven ashore near Gloucester, and became a total wreck.

The British schooner "J. W. Lawrence," of St. John, N. B., Capt. Copp, bound to Boston with a cargo of piles, went ashore three miles from lower end of Plumb Island, on Wednesday, and is a total loss. Crew and Captain's wife saved.

Schooner "M. M. Freeman," of Dennis, Me., went ashore at Cape Ann, and only one man was saved.

The British schooner "Edinburgh" ran ashore at Gloucester. She is full of water.

The schooner "Restless" is stranded at Ipswich.

A Boston pilot boat is supposed to be lost with all hands.

LONDON, 6.

In the House of Lords to-night, the Earl of Derby read a letter from Sir Stafford Northcote correcting a statement made by the former in his speech on Monday night to the effect that there was no understanding between the members of the Joint High Commission that indirect claims were not to be presented, and that the Commissioners were therefore careless in drawing up the treaty. Sir Stafford Northcote declares positively that the Commissioners did understand that a promise was given that claims for indirect damages would be withdrawn. Earl Granville also read a letter from Mr. Schenck, American Minister, affirming that the supplementary article is amply sufficient to exclude indirect claims, and authorizing a statement to be made, as coming from Washington, that the article is a final settlement of the question of said claims. The announcement was received with cheers. Earl Derby said this put a new face on the matter, and he thought the debate ought to stop. [Cheers.] Earl Granville warned the house that indirect claims had not been withdrawn from the American case, but they would be disposed of by the acceptance of the supplementary article to the Treaty of Washington. Earl Russell then withdrew his motion for an address to the Queen, and the debate closed.

The bullion in the Bank of England has increased £935,000 during the week.

LONDON, 7.

The announcement that the Government had withdrawn consent for the departure of the Band of the Grenadier Guards for America was incorrect. The full Band sailed in the steamship "City of Brussels," for New York, playing English and American airs as they left the harbor.

The weather is fair, and the crops are growing favorably.

NEW YORK, 7.

A Washington despatch says official information has been received from London, giving assurance that the English Government accepts the supplementary article to the Treaty of Wash-

ington, as alleged by the Senate, and that the Geneva arbitration will now proceed.

The French Band detailed to participate in the Peace Jubilee reached Boston to-day, and was received with much enthusiasm.

Prizes of \$400 and \$200 are offered at the Boston 4th of July Regatta for the winning four-oared boats in a six mile race open to all comers.

SOMEWHAT STRANGE IF TRUE.

A Jewish Rabbi in Richmond writes to the "Despatch" that the lightning rod of our time was known in the thirteenth century, and quotes from a work extant in 1291 the following: "if you want to prevent thunders from destroying your castle then put on the roof a metal wire, and it will be saved." But more remarkable is that about the telegraph which a Jewish exile in Spain in 1492 wrote: "We have a good proof (for an invisible connection) in the magnet-stone. If you break this stone into two parts (positive and negative), and you lay one part on one side, and the other on the other side, even that they are separated thousands of miles but connected by (a wire of) iron, then every movement which you make on one side will be visible on the other in the same moment."
