Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

Land Regulations.

8 Any person who is the sole head of a tamily, or any mile over 18 at 8 Any person who is the sole head of a tamily, or any mile over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lunds Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his E-mestea on a farm of at least 80 acres will sy wn-ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, orother or sister. 

A bulletin of the Census Office, Ci-swa, issued May 10, makes the fol-owing report on live stock of Can-

da: The report on the condition of live ack is good for all the provinces, be-ing 05 for horses, 92.43 for mileh to vs. 90.56 for other cattle, 93.32 for heep and 94.51 for swine. Alberta is blow 90 for horses, Manitoba, Sne-atchewan and Alberta for mileh tows; Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Al-berta and British Columbia for other withe, and Alberta and British Co-umbia for sheep; but generally the condition ranges about 90 per cent.
