NORTH'D COUNTY COUNCIL DOES NOT LIKE NEW HEALTH ACT

Sec. Treas. acct. of public lands showing a balance due funds of \$1,536.14.

E. P. Williston, acct. Patriotic Fund showing a balance due funds of \$266.69.

Coun. O'Donnell read bill of Oliver Lyons, of Ludlow, in connection with sheep killed by dogs in 1917, amounting to \$60.00.

Coun. Vanderbeck said sheep had been killed before the law came into force and moved that bill not be paid.

On motion of Coun. Hayes return of Walter Mersebrook, collector of rates for the parish of Blackville passed, showing \$100 due collector.

Return of Chas. Underhill collector of rates of the parish of Blackville, passed.

Return of Michael Hogan, collector of rates, parish of Blackville, passed, showing \$100 due collector.

On motion of Coun. Lavoie a sum of \$191.10 was ordered assessed on the parish of Blackville for the support of pauper lunatics for 1919.

Return of Coun. McGraw, collector of rates of district No. 3, Rogersville, passed, showing balance due collector of \$30.88.

On motion of Coun. McKnight the sum of \$312.00 was ordered assessed on the parish of Newcastle for the support of pauper lunatics, 1919.

On motion of Couns. McKnight and Doyle.

Return of Patrick Keane, collector of rates, district No. 1, Newcastle, passed and the default list was ordered to be handed to J. P. for collection.

Return of Patrick Keane, collector of rates, district No. 2, Newcastle, passed.

Sec. Treas. acct. with Newcastle pauper lunatics passed.

Sec. Treas. acct. of Newcastle rates passed.

On motion of Coun. Somers return of J. E. Kerslake, collector of rates, South Esk, passed, showing a balance of \$31.14 due collector.

The return of Edward Goodfellow, collector of rates, South Esk, passed, showing \$21.90 due collector.

Coun. D. Doyle read a resolution asking that a law be enacted allowing no scrub bulls to run at large in the County of Northumberland.

Coun. Doyle said the bill was to improve stock. Agricultural Societies had asked him to bring the matter up. After a lot of discussion the motion was defeated by a vote of 8 to 16.

Coun. O'Donnell asked the clerk of the Peace whether it had a root or not, or any persons have constituted a board, and after any officer had named in the bill is legally in pound.

On motion of Couns. Schofield and Hayes parish officers for the parish of Blackville passed.

On motion of Coun. LeBlanc return of W. Richard road tax collector, passed.

Sec. Treas. acct. with the parish clerk, Rogersville, passed.

Sec. Treas. acct. with Rogersville parish officers passed.

Sec. Treas. acct. with Rogersville roads, passed.

Adjourned until 10 o'clock Thursday.

THURSDAY

Warren called Council to order at 10 a. m. Minutes read and approved.

Coun. LeBlanc moved to excuse Coun. Lavoie for absence today. He has been called home by important business.

Carried.

On motion of Coun. Doyle it was resolved that no July session be held, but that the Wardens appoint a committee of five to pass accounts.

Coun. LeBlanc moved that L. Evangeline be paid \$10 for translating and publishing a report of the Council. Carried.

Coun. Somers wanted to know why the dog tax had not been assessed and collected in all the parishes.

Sec. Treas. said he couldn't answer that without going all over the county and making inquiries. The law made provision for the assessment. The collector of rates was not necessarily the collector of dog taxes.

Coun. Watling said he was against the dog tax from the first. Some parishes paid nothing, and those who paid should get their money back.

The Sec. Treas. read the Act, showing that the assessors were bound to have lists made of all the dogs in their parishes—the tax to be collected in the same manner and time as other taxes.

Coun. O'Donnell—Is it the duty of the Clerk of the Peace to instruct the assessors?

Sec. Treas.—Yes, if they apply for instruction.

Coun. Watling—Our assessors got 10 per cent, though they were not entitled to anything, as they did not assess the tax.

Coun. Fowle asked if a dog owner who was taxed and did away with the dog, was obliged to pay.

Sec. Treas.—I should say that everyone who had a dog on the first of May would have to pay taxes on it. The collector must have a warrant from a justice of the peace to kill a dog.

Resolved, That the Secretary Treasurer notify assessors of their duty

respecting the assessing of dog taxes.

Coun. E. J. Parker—What was done with the dog tax.

Sec. Treas.—It is in my accounts.

Coun. Thos. Parker said the law required the county to enforce the dog tax after having made a bylaw to put the act in force? Was the bylaw adopted?

Sec. Treas.—Yes, and Thos. Parker was on the By-law Committee that reported it for adoption.

Coun. O'Shaughnessy said the town dogs went into the country and killed sheep. Who paid for the sheep? The towns kept the dog taxes. They collected.

Coun. Watling said there were dogs in his district that ought to be shot, and he wanted to know if any one could kill them.

Sec. Treas.—Only if they chase sheep.

Coun. Doyle said a farmer could make a dog-owner pay for killing sheep.

Coun. Watling—Make the parishes that didn't pay last year, pay, or those who did pay should have the amount refunded.

Coun. Fowle moved that the persons who would dog taxes last year be credited with the payments on this year's taxes.

Coun. Thos. Parker said the dog tax was not a parish but a county fund. How could it be taken from the county and given to parishes?

Coun. Watling—Let those who paid the tax last year go clear this year.

Coun. Thos. Parker said if one parish paid all should pay.

Coun. McKnight said no taxes should be collected for last year unless they had been properly assessed.

Coun. Doyle said we had no authority to do anything with a fund except to pay for sheep that had been killed. Collect the taxes that were not collected last year.

Coun. Watling—We can't do that at all.

Coun. O'Shaughnessy said the assessors of his parish assessed no dog taxes last year. Have we any authority to order the new assessors and collectors to assess and collect taxes that were not levied last year?

Sec. Treas.—Yes.

Clerk of the Peace—If the tax has not been assessed it cannot be collected.

Sec. Treas.—There is a section in this Act providing for the collection of back taxes that assessors have not levied.

Sec. Treas.—The only way a tax can be refunded is on individual petition.

The motion was voted out of order.

Coun. LeBlanc moved that the Secretary Treasurer be authorized to borrow \$500 for the financial exigencies of the county. Carried.

Coun. Anderson moved that no bill be allowed to run at large in Alwayick and that it be referred to the By-law Committee.

Sec. Treas. said that was a county by-law now, and the motion was not pressed.

Adjourned till 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON

Session resumed at 2 p. m.

Coun. Fowle moved that the Bay on Vin River be increased to 1.2 cents instead of 1.2 cents. Referred to By-law Committee.

Coun. Watling said his parish had been charged for the support of a pauper lunatic belonged to Chatham. He objected to passing the account. The person did not belong to his parish.

The Warden—Why not move a resolution instructing the Sec. Treas. not to pay.

Coun. McNaughton objected to the bill as a charge against Glenelg.

Coun. Thos. Parker, from the By-law Committee, moved a by-law forbidding the running at large of cattle in part of the parish of Blissett. Adopted.

Also that sec. 1 of By-law No. 7, relating to dogs, be repealed, it being inconsistent with the by-law passed last session.

Coun. O'Shaughnessy moved a memorial to the Government for the repeal of the Game Act provisions requiring licensees to take an oath to inform on violators of Game laws, and forbidding the sale of wild meat.

Many carcasses were left to rot in the woods as the hunter could not dispose of the meat. Men shouldn't have to pay for the privilege of being informers.

Coun. Waing was glad that it was proposed to protest against the law forbidding the sale of game. It was a very unfair law.

Coun. Allan—Why didn't they salt the carcasses, or give it away? Why leave it in the woods to rot?

Coun. Watling said many persons didn't know how to salt moose meat.

Carried.

Coun. Watling protested against the charging of part of the default list to parishes that had no defaulters.

Coun. Doyle moved that the petition of the janitor of the Court House, for more salary, be referred to the Petitions Committee. Carried.

Coun. Somers moved that the South Esk parish clerk bill and the road account pass. Carried.

Coun. McNaughton moved that the return of Collector Watling of Glenelg the collector's return for road tax and dog tax, the assessment of \$60 for per lunatic pauper lunatics account, return of John Rose on non-resident taxes, also list of parish officers, pass.

Carried.

Coun. McKnight moved list of officers for Newcastle. Passed.

Coun. Watling thought the Council should do something to thank the men who have been fighting our battles. He hoped something would be done.

Coun. E. J. Parker moved that a committee be appointed for the purpose. Carried. Committee—Schofield, J. Parker, Watling.

Mayor Troy, on motion of Coun. Vanderbeck, was heard on the Salvation Army Million Dollar drive, and eloquently advocated the claims of that body on public generosity.

The Warden said the same men who conducted the Y. M. C. A. and K. of C. drives were conducting this one.

Coun. Vanderbeck moved that \$100 be voted for the purpose.

Coun. Hayes moved in amendment that \$200 be voted.

The motion \$100 was adopted without debate or division.

Mayor Troy thanked the Council and the Councilors for their donation.

Coun. Fowle moved list of Hardwick officers. Passed.

Coun. Fowle said sorry the Councilors had not looked higher than \$100 for the Army.

Coun. Gil moved list of parish officers for Ludlow, \$250 for pauper lunatics. Return of Thos. Lynch, col. of rates, return of Peter O'Neill, col. of rates, return of Thos. Lynch, col. of road tax, do. col. of default, pass. Carried.

Coun. O'Shaughnessy moved parish accounts of North Esk, returns of Jos. Sobey, John Forsyth, Herbert Fair, Anthony Cain, assessment of \$140 for pauper lunatics, pass. Carried.

All Doyle moved that the Sec. Treas. be authorized to have Hon. Peter Mitchell's picture engraved and suitably framed. Carried.

Coun. Allan moved that \$110 for pauper lunatics, Alwayick, and returns of J. W. Levesque, Albert Mazzarini, J. R. Barclay, Robert B. Robichaud, pass. Carried.

Coun. Fowle moved that \$118 be assessed on Hardwick for pauper lunatics, and returns of Jubal McQuinn, Frank McQuinn, and road account pass. Carried.

Coun. Anderson submitted the report of the Board of Health.

An epidemic of snailpox prevailed during the first few months of the year. 251 cases and there were 47 cases of diphtheria, 75 of measles, 111 of scarlet fever, and a few mild cases of typhoid. During October, November and December influenza became epidemic over a large section of the county. 1,157 cases being reported, with 167 deaths. The disease in the nursing camps was of a very severe type. Doctors were sent to Rogersville and Blackville, and trained nurses were sent to the afflicted. The Board did all it could to keep down the disease while doing everything possible to relieve the afflicted and combat the disease. (Signed) J. W. Van derbeck, Wm. Anderson, F. J. Desmond.

Coun. Thos. Parker reported in favor of the Bay du Vin by-law amendment. Adopted.

Coun. O'Shaughnessy moved that the county dog tax account pass—\$226.40; security account, St. John's Mer. Co. bill for public wharf, \$28.85; bill of J. Weir, \$46; bill of B. F. Malby, in staying allowance in jail, \$68.75 (to be charged to Land Fund); bill of M. S. Co. \$68. T. H. Whelan, \$15, pass. Carried.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Take Notice that the Municipality will apply at the next meeting of the Local Legislature to pass an Act to amend Chapter Two of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick 1903 entitled an Act Respecting the Division of the Province into Counties, Towns and Parishes by repealing the sections of the said act in which division of the Parishes of South Esk and Jersey are stated and enacting the following amendments:

(11) Parish of South Esk—North and South by a line from the County line and South by a line commencing at the Canadian Government Railway Bridge across the North West Branch of the Miramichi River thence South along the said Railway to the Southern side of the overland bridge crossing the said railway thence in a westerly direction till it strikes the lower line of Thomas Young's lot at the South East Corner thereof thence westerly along the rear line of the grants bounded on South West Miramichi River to the rear of the Davidson grants thence on the same courses as the rear of the Davidson grants to the Blackville line thence along the parish lines of Blackville, Blissett and Ludlow to the County Line.

(12) Derby West by Blackville North by South Esk east by the lower extremity of Beaubear's Island and to include the same and South by the South West Branch of the Miramichi River.
