## Roman Intelligence.

ROME, Sept. 19.

Father Emmanuel Kemmer, a Franciscan missionary in Egypt, for the services rendered by him to suffering humanity during the war of last year, and during the cholera epidemic, which spread desolation over a great part of that country.

## The Provincial Exhibition.

Now that the annual Provincial Exhibition is over, we may pronounce it a success, and a success in every respect. The weather, on which an Exhibition so much depends, was all that could be desired, except for an hour or two on Thursday; but as the real business had been done before that, it interfered only with pleasure-seekers, and that momentarily. The number of people who attended the Exhibition was unusually large, and the exhibits showed a steady and gratifying improvement on former years. Everyone was struck with the improvement in live stock, and none more so than those who came from a distance. We may safely say that in this respect the Island has advanced twenty per cent, while as for its agricultural products it has more than maintained its reputation as the Garden of Canada. The exhibition of horses was splendid, and will in future enhance the value of these animals for exportation purposes. It would be inadvisable to institute comparisons or to award prizes where almost equal credit should be given to all. The show of stallions was remarkably good, and the competition was keen in the extreme, so much so that the judges found it a matter of no slight difficulty to award the prizes. The exhibit of cattle was also good, and though neither Ayrshire nor Short-horns were in abundance, what were shown were excellent. There was a large exhibit of sheep of superior quality. There were not many large pigs; but the exhibit showed good breeds and speaks well for the future. The show in poultry was not extensive. The grain exhibit was magnificent. Fifty different samples were shown, all good, and rivaling the boasted products of the North-west. It is interesting to note the true roots of which the show was large and encouraging. The fruit exhibit was very poor, and save a few good apples nothing worth mentioning was to be seen. Many people labor under the delusion that the Island cannot raise fruit to any extent owing to the summer being so short, but that is a good delusion. It is equally true that the district around Lunenburg, famous for its apples, and which has a summer as short as ours, Fruit growing has been neglected, and that is the grand defect.

## General News Items.

Russia is reported to be about contracting for a loan of one hundred million roubles.

The Black Flags in Tonquin are reported to be retreating to the Chinese frontier.

It is stated that France is determined to precipitate a settlement of the Tonquin question forthwith.

The import of swine from Russia into Germany has been prohibited by the German Government.

Bishop Cleary of Kingston, Ont., left that city for Rome. He takes with him over eight thousand dollars subscribed in the diocese for Peter's Pence.

The official organ of the Spanish Government declares that whilst the Government desires satisfaction for the insults to the flag of St. Peter's, it wishes to avoid making impossible demands for redress.

In a pastoral Cardinal McCabe, of Dublin, declares that while many Irish educational grievances have been redressed much yet remains to be done.

The writ for Lavel, to justify the House of Commons in the resignation, was issued Tuesday. Nomination tickets were placed on the 18th inst. and the election on the 26th.
