On July 29, three days after the Cardinal Secretary of State had indited the note from which we have quoted, the French Minister for Foreign Affairs sent this telegram to the Charge d'Affaires at te Vatican: "After having on sever. 1 occasions called attention to the serious attacks the Holy See, by dealing directly with French bishops, has made upon the rigits of the State as loonceded by the Concordat, the Government of the Rapublic, in two notes of July 23, informed the Holy See of the conclusions it would be forced to draw from a persistent violation of these rights. As we are forced by the tenor of the reyly of the Cardinal Secretary of State in his note of July 26 to recognize that the Holy See defends these acts done without the knowledge of the Civil Power with which it had negotiated the Concordat, the Government of the Republic has decided to sever official relations which, through the voluntary actions of the Holy Soe, can no longer serve any purpose. After delivering this note you will add that we consider the mission of the Apostolic Nancio as terminated.

"Signed——Delcasse." The correspondence, as published in the Journal Officiel ends with the following telegram from the Charge d'Affoires at the Vatican:
