The Mongolian left Glasgow on May 5 and Liverpool a few days later with nearly 500 passengers for St. John's Halifax and Philadelphia. She met the first of the great fields of ice on the 18th but up to Wednesday morning her progress was fairly steady. With the approach to John's was sighted, the great steamer forced its way through the ice floes until a position about a mile off the harbor opening had been gained.
