

Rough Time in the House of Commons

Special Evening Telegram, 2.

LONDON, this morning.—The House of Commons, the popular name of the scene of a riot last night, over Asquith's proposal to rescind the action of Monday, when the Unionists carried by a majority of 22 Sir Fred Banbury's amendment, defeating the most important financial feature of the Home Rule Bill. The Unionists refused to permit the decision and the Speaker was forced to adjourn the session on account of the disorder. This is an extremely rare occurrence, and the situation is considered a critical one. The Unionists threatened that they will continue to make business in the House impossible unless the Prime Minister accepts the amendment, or drops the Home Rule Bill. They declare his action is unprecedented, and will be obstructed by unprecedented measures. Their object is to force the Government to resign. The uproar far exceeded that which stifled Premier Asquith's speech when he introduced the bill, and has not been equalled since the free fight over Gladstone's first Home Rule measure. The ministers were taunted with epithets such as "Traitor," "Ape," etc. Sir William Hall, Unionist M.P., for Hammersmith was ordered from the floor for repeatedly calling Premier Asquith a "Traitor." After the adjournment, the Unionists doubled up programmes, and threw them across the floor at the Prime Minister. Spencer Churchill was hit with a heavy book hurled from the camp of the enemy. A free fight appeared imminent, until Crooks labor member, poured oil on the troubled waters by starting to sing "Auld Lang Syne." When the session began, the benches were packed with Asquith's followers, who greeted him with cheers on his entrance, and demonstrated their were present in force by defeating a motion for adjournment early in the proceedings by a vote of 327 to 218. The subject of Asquith's motion was that Banbury's amendment be rescinded, notwithstanding anything in any standing order of the House, and that the order of the House in respect to the Home Rule Bill take effect as though Monday's proceedings had not taken place. The effect of this would practically begin again the consideration of the Bill at the clause where Banbury's amendment was offered. Bonar Law, leader of the Opposition, and the floor quickly, and inquired whether there was any precedent for the Government's course, or whether it would not destroy all safeguards for the regularity of the House's proceedings. Amidst loud Opposition cheers, the Speaker replied that he could find no precedent for rescinding a division of the House, arrived during the passage of a bill. Whether it would destroy the safeguards of the House was a matter of which every member must form his own opinion. There was a long discussion on the Parliamentary points, and then Asquith rose and said no notice had been given of the amendment offered by Banbury, and that its discussion was brief. He doubted if the members on either side had appreciated its importance. It would reduce the \$30,000,000, which it was proposed to transfer to the Irish Government, to \$12,500,000.

TORONTO, Nov. 13. Local military men are inclined to discredit a report from Winnipeg that British Army reservists have been notified to hold themselves in readiness for immediate mobilization. No notification has been received here by the Reservists who number between 40 and 50. General Cotton, however, held that it was possible notification had been received at Winnipeg, as it was the policy of the British War Office to notify distant parts first.

Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, Nov. 13.

The hopes of the Unionists in connection with the Home Rule Bill were destroyed by the Speaker of the Commons to-day. The Unionists desired the Speaker to declare out of order Premier Asquith's motion to rescind the decision of the Committee of the House which amended the financial section on Monday. The Speaker said that the Premier's motion was unprecedented, but quite in order. The Premier then submitted the motion, and in support of it said that if the House did not reverse its decision on Sir Fred Banbury's amendment, the Government would be unable to proceed with the Bill. A prolonged debate is expected.

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.

"I feel confident, if nothing happens, we shall have two steamship lines operating between Galway and Halifax inside of three years," declared Robert Worthington, steamship magnate of Dublin and London, here to-day. Mr. Worthington has been at Ottawa consulting with Premier Borden and members of the Government, and yesterday completed negotiations with Sir Thomas Shaughnessy of the C.P.R. "The future of the project," said Worthington, "first of all means a great saving of time, because the new line of steamers will require only 3 1/2 days to complete the voyage; secondly, it will mean a concrete link between Ireland and America, and this is what my country needs more than anything else just at present."
