## Modern Football.

## Household Notes

Eggs when scrambled should be stirred constantly. There is no finer polish for tinware than wood ashes.

A sweet red pepper should always hang in the canary's cage.

Always turn saltfish skin side up when soaking it to freshen.

A flannel dipped in turpentine will clean a porcelain tub excellently.

Shoes will last much longer if rubbed with vaseline when they are new.

A few drops of ammonia in the dishwater will brighten the glass and silver.

Soap should be bought in quantities; remove the wrapper and allow it to dry.

Bread and butter spread with chopped dates makes excellent school sandwiches.

A fallow skin is sometimes caused by an undue consumption of tea, coffee or cocoa.

To pad the edges of dollies before embroidering them, work them in a coarse chainstitch.

If you spill ink on the carpet, put salt on it immediately; it will help remove the spot.

To slice bacon properly, slice down to the rind; do no attempt to slice through the rind.

To do away with the sound of a watch in the sick room, place the watch under a tumbler.

Paint the handles of the garden tools a bright red; they will be hard to lose and easily found.

Suet may be kept fresh by chopping roughly and sprinkling it with a little granulated sugar.

A long-handled buttonhook should be kept in the laundry to clean the lint from the tub outlets.

Wrap cheese in a cloth moistened with vinegar if you would keep it moist and free from mould.

September is the month for putting up peaches, also for making crabapple and quince jelly.

Broken rice is that which is sifted from the higher priced grains, and is equally good in flavor.

Button loops will be much stronger if the loops are crocheted over with a fine crochet hook.

When milk boils over, sprinkle salt on the stove at once; this will counteract the unpleasant odor.

Condensed milk is cheaper and as good as fresh milk for the making of cocoa, puddings and ice cream.

A small piece of camphor in the water in which cut flowers are put will make them last much longer.

If stockings are turned inside out when they are put with the general laundry, they will not be lirty.

The efficient housekeeper knows that sharp knives save time, patience and give better results than dull ones.
