Losing Things.

Is there anything in the world more exasperating than to drop some little thing, or to think, a dime or the classic collar button, stoop to recover it, and find it inexplicably vanished? Usually, of course, the disappearance is temporary. After doing a little sacrifice to the evil spirit of inanimate objects by getting down on your hands and knees, wriggling about on your stomach and bumping your head against the table, you find the lost article hiding under the corner of the rug or cleverly playing peek-a-boo from behind a chair leg.

Some Things Never Did Reappear. But I remember darkly, that there have been occasions when some small article never did reappear. How do I account for it? I don't. Some things, even in this day and generation, cannot be explained. For which I'm not altogether sorry. Are you?

Someone has a very clever essay about the general cussedness of inanimate objects, such as the affinity of chair rockers for ankles, and this same devilish ingenuity of small objects about secreting themselves. Her eraser and her pencil were particularly gifted in this respect, until she (I think it was Agnes Repplier) discovered a clever way of getting around them. She supplied herself with two of each article, and then when one disappeared, she refused to hunt for it but simply used the other. Whereat, finding that it could not plague her, the article soon came to light.

Something Paralyzing About Hunting For Things. There is nothing I dislike in the world more than hunting for things. There is something peculiarly paralyzing to me in the thought of concentrating my attention on the floor or the ground. Barrie tells of a man who hated explanations so much, that when he rang for the morning paper and his servant brought him the coals, he took the coals rather than explain. I am that way about losing things. That is, I would rather lose a thing of considerable value than do any extended hunting for it.

The Way People Hunt For Things. But I like to watch other people hunt. The way in which people hunt for lost articles, is an interesting key to character.

Some people go about it in a vague, uncertain way. They pull up a rug here or move a chair there. Others go over the ground so hastily and impatiently that they are not sure the article wasn't there after all, and presently have to go over it again. Others are systematic; they cover one definite unit of space thoroughly, and then move on to the next.

The latter, needless to say, are the people who find what they are looking for.

The Retirement of Von Jagow.

(N. Y. Times.)

The ill-health which Mr. von Jagow gives as the reason for his resignation of the post of Minister of Foreign Affairs can hardly be regarded as a pretext to "save his face," for he pleaded it vastly when the Kaiser appointed him to that thankless post in January, 1913. As Ambassador to Italy Mr. von Jagow won laurels in the time of the Tripoli adventure. Germany's position and influence in Turkey, created largely by the skill and tact of Marschall von Bieberstein, the only great German diplomatist since Bismarck, unless von Buelow be so reckoned, were obviously endangered by the conduct of her ally. There was a formidable explosion of wrath against Italy in the German press. The Italian press did not turn the other cheek to the snifter. D'Annunzio poured forth a sulphurous ode, which was suppressed by the Italian Government when the Italian fury against Germany had been turned against France. The detention of some French vessels carrying supplies to the enemy revived old latent enmities between the two Latin nations. Ambassador von Jagow manoeuvred dexterously. His success in that, his first considerable diplomatic service, recommended him to the Kaiser, an old Bonn comrade.

It would be unfair to blame von Jagow or the Chancellor for whatever blunders, whatever misreadings of the minds of other nations, may be attributed to Germany shortly before the war. The Kaiser is or has been his own Foreign Minister, and the Chancellor's first task is to satisfy him. As the war has gone on, a larger responsibility has fallen on the officials, and they have been supported by the Kaiser. It was reported in August, 1915, that von Jagow would be forced out of office on account of the Kaiser's displeasure with the sending of the Austrian note, unread by his Foreign Minister, to the United States, and the publication in the Belgian Gray Book of his proposal to divide the Belgian Congo. The rumor has been revived frequently since, and always the capable Under Secretary Zimmermann has been mentioned as his successor.

As the war goes on, generals and statesmen are tried, and scrapped if found wanting. The best brains come to the fore. Mr. Zimmermann is a strong, liberal, and popular man, whose abilities have impressed themselves on the Kaiser and the public, and public opinion has to be listened to nowadays. Mr. von Jagow is not a ready speaker of a powerful personality, but in the long fight between the moderates and the ruthless extremists he has been steadily moderate. Before the war he was friendly to the English. Sir W. E. Goschen, British Ambassador at Berlin, the day of his famous "scrap of paper" interview with the Chancellor, the day a mob threatened the British Embassy, wrote four days afterward of Mr. von Jagow's "full and complete apology" for the behaviour of the mob and of the Minister's "charming letter, couched in the most friendly terms." A gentleman, in war as in peace. In the submarine controversy with the United States Mr. von Jagow showed a friendly spirit. He is one of the few Germans of distinction who have subscribed to the Monroe Doctrine. He has skirted perilous situations. To the United States he has been of good-will, within the limitations of his position, made doubly difficult by the sharp divisions of German opinion on submarine policy. His successor, Mr. Zimmermann, has cultivated cordial relations with American correspondents. That he is of the "middle class," while von Jagow is of the ancient Brandenburg nobility, is hardly significant. Mr. von Jagow's predecessor, the late Kiderlen-Waechter, was also a "bourgeois," a bourgeois who rather liked to imitate the brusquerie of Bismarck.
