#### Land Held Two and One-Half Centuries

CHANGES HANDS IN MONTREAL For only the second time in nearly three hundred years, the strip of land situated between Cote Des Neiges Westmount Boulevard, has changed hands, says the Montreal "Star."

Passing along Cote des Neiges Road to-day one notices that a broad expanse of the city below, heretofore obstructed by the wall built over two hundred years ago by the Gentlemen of Saint Sulpice, has now been thrown into view. For many years there have been complaints about the presence of this old wall, but it stayed on, No doubt residents of that section of the city will now rejoice with its disappearance, although the new houses being constructed on the property will blot out at least part of the picture.

The property which has just been purchased by the Newton Dakin Construction Company has been in the hands of the Sulpicians since 1657, and belonged previously to that, to the Montreal Society.

The "Societe de Montreal," as they called themselves, was a party of high church people in Paris, who received the island as a grant from the King in 1640, and raised money to send a governor and settlers here, as well as missionaries to convert the Indians

Seven years later, the town and is and of Montreal was in danger of being abandoned. Many of the members of the Society were old and others lost interest in their colony. It was then, in the year 1650 that the Gentlemen of St. Sulpice accepted charge of Montreal. Before making the actual settlement in 1657, four Sulpicians were sent to Montreal to take charge of the seigneury and the Church. Until that time the Jesuits were the only religious order that had been here and there had been no parish, and all the registers were kept in Latin. On the arrival of the Sulpicians a parish was formed, with

Gabriel Souart as its first rector. Later the Society of Montreal made definite donation of all its rights to the Seminary of St. Sulpice, who received the grant of the whole island with the understanding that they would bring out settlers. The Act of ratified by Louis XIV,, and the Sulpicians actually took possession of the island on the eighteen of August 1663, and all the land was divided

under seigneurial tenure. By degrees tenants bought over their land from the seigneurs, and became free-holders, although many farmers throughout the province still prefer to pay their rent of five or ten dollars a year, rather than buy the farms which are worth perhaps as much as fifty thousand, many of them

#### Russian Warship Disarmed

And Admiral Removed by French Government,

BIZERTA, Tunis, Dec. 5 .- The squadron of General Baron Peter Wrangel, who was at the head of the anti-Bolshevik compaign in the Crimea, which has been lying in Bizerta Roads since December, 1920, was disarmed to-day. All the guns, torpedo tubes and other armaments vere removed from the two battleships, two cruisers, nine torpedo boats and four submarines comprising the squadron. Part of the crews were dispersed, while the remainder have been given shelter in the French

Naval Barracks at Sidi Almez. A Soviet Commission recently was appointed by the Moscow Government to come to Bizerta and demand the return of the war craft to the Soviet Government. A threat by Admiral Exelman's Port Admiral of Bizerta and Commander-in-Chief of the French naval forces in North African waters, that he would have the Russian Commission thrown into the sea if it called on him, resulted in the Admiral being removed from his post by the French Government.

Most of the journals, however, conferred the assignment upon their cricket writers. It was in the momenclature of cricket that all of them reported to the populace upon what they had seen. Each and every one of them pitied

How a pitcher can pitch with Hugley Jennings razzing him from the third-base line and the crowd yelling remarks of a not particularly complimentary nature, is a little more, seemingly, than the quiet, peaceful Briton can understand. Nor does he find it easy to comprehend how a batsman can be so insensitive as to be able to do his job with the catcher chattering away on a line of

intentionally irritating remarks. That the Giants and White Sox will succeed in their aim of implanting baseball in Great Britain no native believes. To the majority of the English it seems to be a slow, monotonous game. It does not last three days like a cricket match, with several hundred runs and time out for tea and lunch. But nevertheless and notwithstanding, they do find it slow.
