## LAST NIGHT'S HOCKEY.

The hockey game, between the Guards and Terra Novas drew another large attendance to the Prince's rink, included in the number present being His Excellency the Governor and Lady Alford. The game in the whole was only a draw, and saw the Guards fall down under the crushing attacks of the Guards by the one-sided score of nine to two. The Guards played the services of "Billy" Clouston, who met with an injury in the first game. Henley Munn filled his position nicely and, with Ralph Herder on the line-up for the first time in season, the front line proved to be as strong as ever. The Terra Nov-

as had a new addition to their team in the person of Gordon Johnstone, who gave good service while he was on the ice. Mr. J. M. Tobin, the official referee, controlled the game.

## First Period

The game opened up at 7.35 with an excellent sheet of ice. The Terras pressed matters and confined the rubber to Guards territory, but the play was quickly transferred to the other end by J. Herder. Several end to end rushes followed without any result, until four minutes of play had elapsed when Errol Munn scored a pretty goal from the side. The brand of hockey then grew rather ragged, and the referee was kept blowing his whistle for off-sides and deliberate kicks of the puck. Repeated attacks then followed on the opposing goals, with good individual runs by Patterson of the Guards, and Canning and Gillis for the Terras, but nothing materialized. Henley Munn, for body checking Peters a moment later was given a two minute rest. During his absence Peters made a successful get away and evened up matters by a well directed shot from the outside. Canning tried another of his spectacular runs almost immediately and nearly scored. The Guards pressed hard during the close of the period, and from a face-off in front of the Terra Nova goal, E. Munn lost no time in launching the puck through scoring No. 2. The gong sounded leaving the Guards, 2 goals; Terras 1.

## Second Period

Upon resumption of play Gillis made an end to end run but the shot barely missed the mark. The Terras pressed hard to equalize, and both Field and Canning were trying their hardest to score. The Guards defence were successful in stopping all onslaughts. Play transferred to the other end and just about the moment when Gillis was getting started for another of his runs, Henley Munn skated in fast, captured the disc and easily beat Field, scoring No. 3. Ralph Herder then made his appearance on the ice. Play was now confined to Terra territory, with Whelan, E. Munn and R. Herder pressing hard for further results, but goals were lost through lack of combination. Ralph Herder made a bold effort to score, but Peters managed to clear, but lost to Henley Munn, who once again bulged the twines with a terrific shot. Jim Herder was next benched for a slight infringement and he was followed in quick succession by Barrett of the Terras. As play progressed a good exhibition of hockey was handed out. Errol Munn got in some very tricky play, using the boards to advantage, but he was frustrated from scoring by hard back checking. Before the gong sounded to close the period Henley Munn, who was playing a good game in centre ice, once again found the net for his team. Period ended Guards 4; Terras 1.

## Third Period

From the drop of the puck in the final session the Terras rushed hard to narrow down the score, but they found the Guards defence lines hard to beat and from then on they appeared to have lost heart. According to play progressed, the Guards had the upper hand, and the exhibition put up by the Terras was one of disappointment to their supporters. The game, however, took on a different aspect when Canning took the puck from near his own goal, and made a pretty sweep of the rink with Clarke alongside. Canning passed to Clark near the goal, the puck hitting the boards from behind the net and same

out to the front. Canning then skated in hard and scored, in 5-1-2 minutes. This play brought forth the plaudits of their supporters. Play quickly changed, however, when Henley Munn came back thirty seconds later and easily beat Field for another counter. From then on it was all Guards, with Errol Munn in possession of the puck. Jim Herder, who was playing one of his best games for the season, made a successful getaway and upon drawing near his opponents' goal, made a perfect pass to Errol Munn, who was responsible for the final goal. Full time then sounded, leaving the Guards victors by the one-sided score of 9 goals to 2.

## THE PHANTOM FINN AGAIN.

Pavo Nurmi, at Chicago last night, smashed his seventh world's indoor record since making his debut in New York ten days ago, when he decisively defeated Joe Ray, America's champion runner, by half a lap, nearly 80 yards, in a special mile and three-quarters race.

The "Phantom Finn," after riding all night and all day from New York, where he smashed three records on Thursday night, ran Ray to defeat in 7.22 2-5, clipping a fifth of a second off the world's indoor mark established by himself in his New York triumph. The latter was raced on an eight-lap track, while this was 14 laps, with short turns.

Nurmi, leading from start to finish, ran the mile in 4.29, the 1.14 mile in 6.35 4-5, and the 1.1-2 mile in 6.44 2-5. Nurmi's run was a sensational one, especially well greased.

Victory, Nurmi was aboard a fast train bound for New York to compete in another race to-night, making his third in as many nights. He was in Chicago less than three hours. He arrived at 8.10 p.m., hopped into a taxi awaiting him at the station, sped to the Coliseum, raced, and was off again on another one thousand mile ride back to New York.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Jan. 19.—Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., was given the decision over Joe Gans, Allentown, Pa., in a fast ten-round fight here to-night.

## FLOWERS OUT IN SECOND.

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Jack Delaney knocked out Tiger Flowers in the second round to-night. Delaney, at the start, was content to feel out the negro. Several wild rushes sent Delaney to the ropes, and he continued to wriggle away as the negro kept boring in. Only once in the first round did Delaney open up and then he let go with his powerful right to the negro's ribs, a blow which sent Flowers back on his heels, and ate up his aggressiveness.

The second round opened as the first, Delaney on the defensive, but after but 43 seconds of the round had expired suddenly opened up. He led with a left jab and then his driving right came through with an uppercut against the negro's jaw.

The negro sank to the canvas in a helpless heap. The count of five found him flat on his back. He got to a half reclining position, only to sink back again as the referee sounded the fatal ten.

BOSTON—Pres. J. N. Willys has addressed letter to preferred stockholders of Willys-Overland Co. stating in part:

"As an owner of Willys-Overland preferred stock you will be interested in Dec. 31 balance sheet which you will receive in near future."

"I believe it will be the best financial statement ever issued by this institution. It will show cash and bank certificates of deposit to more than cover our current liabilities, with no notes payable of any nature. 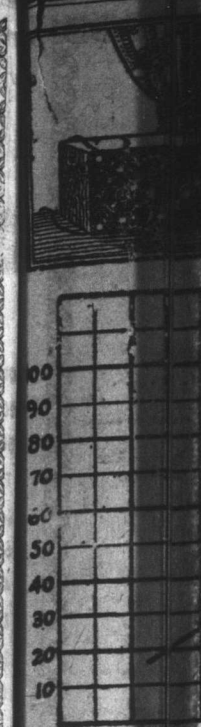
