### DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Ottawa, May 7.
After some unimportant business, Mr.

Mr. Mills resumed the adjourned debate on his motion in favour of an elective instead of a nominated Senate.

A suggestion to adjourn the debate having been made and withdrawn, Mr. Mackenzie desired to speak with all respect of the Senate, but it was an inevitable tendency of the Government to place their friends in the places that became vacant, and it must be admitted that the character of the Senate had greatly changed since its first appointment in 1867.

Hon. Mr. Tilley said that until a good and sufficient reason should be found for changing the Constitution, it was well to leave things as they were.

The vote was taken shortly after midnight, with the following result:—Yeas 46, nays 61.

Mr. Hillyard Cameron's Bill relating to bills of exchange was then read a second time.

Mr. Colby moved the second reading of his Bill to relieve certain charitable and educational institutions from the disabili-ties they labour under as to rates of

interest.

The House adjourned at midnight.

Redistribution of Seats in Britain.

—In the Commons on Tuesday night, Sir Charles Dilke moved a resolution that in the opinion of the House it is desirable to redress inequalities in the distribution of political power in the United Kingdom. He complained that the legitimate influence of large and important towns was swamped by small and decaying boroughs, in which the power of a single individual was paramount over the constituency. Mr. G. Anderson, member for Glasgow, seconded the motion and showed that England was entitled to 490, instead of 493 members of Parlianent: I reland to 39 instead of 60. Mr. Gladstone acknowledged the force of the reasons on which the motion was based. He was in favour of the redistribution of seats in Ireland but that was not urgent. A division of the House was finally reached and the motion was lost on the following vote—for the motion 77, against 268.

The Pacific Railway Investication.

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THE PACIFIC RAILWAY INVESTIGATION As English manufacturer recently laid a wager of a thousand guineas with a neighbor that he would take a pair of sheep at five o'clock in the morning, and finish a coat made from the wool before nime o'clock in the evening. The wager was accepted. The sheep were brought at the appointed time; they were shorn, the wool scoured, spun and woven; the cloth scoured, dyed, pressed and inished at four o'clock p.m. The cloth was then handed to the tailors, and at twenty minutes before nine the garment was finished. The wager was won, and a feat hitherto unprecedented in textile manufacture was accomplished. -A despatch says: The Pacific Railway Committee met this morning and adopted the motion made by Mr. Blake, that the public be admitted to the proceedings of the Committee. Nothing further was transacted, though it is the impression that the Committee will meet in Montreal, if it ever meets, which is doubtful, as the Government does not want inquiry made. Thus, it will be seen the Government have been compelled to give way to public sentiment in order to ward oil for a time the condemnation which is approaching nearer every day. Doubtless they sincerely wished the proceedings to be carried on in secret, but could not maintain their position, because their servile followers dare not go to that extremity.

A delegate from the Prince Edward Island Government, to complote arrangements for the admission of the Island into the Union, have arrived at Ottawa. The following compose the delegates: J.\*C. Pope, J. H. Haviland, J. W. Wardlaw and W. H. Pope.

It is stated in the lobbies that the House will adjourn early next week, to be called together next fall for the settlement of the Prince Edward Island affair.

"STEEPED TO THE LITS IN CEREPTION."
—The Globe's Ottawa correspondent says:
—Sir John A. Maedonald's attempt to rub out his old score against Sir Francis Hincks will, not have raised him at all in the personal estimation of former Parliamentary acquantances to whom the facts are familiae. Mr. Blake charged John A. Maedonald with having once told Sir Francis Hincks that he was steeped to the lips in corruption. Sir John A. Maedonald's explanation was: 1st, That it was the Administration of which Sir Francis Hincks was a member, not the latter personally, to whom the remark was applied; 2ndly, That he put the charge "hypothetically, and not as a direct accusation;" and lastly, That Jir. Fergusson Blair, since deceased, had told him (Sir John Maedonald) that the allegation then made did not apply to Sir Francis Hincks, who was innocent of the charge. Unfortunately for this effort to put a gloss on an affair which subsequent events have made inconvenient to the parties concerned, there were in the House of Commons itself gentlemn who could testify, of their own knowledge, to the painful directness of the accusation, and its unmistakeable application to Sir Francis Hincks. Mr. Fergusson Blair is no longer here; it was sefe, therefore, to quote his alleged testimony; but it was rather strange that Sir F. Hincks gave no sign.
