We condense the following from late tolegrams to the Tribune hereon:--Gincinnati, Feb. 23..--Reports from various points show no weakening on the part of the ladies in the cause of tempor-ance. At Mount Vernon 200 ladies pa-raded to-day, and the bells have been ringing over their conquests. Five sur-renders are recorded. Five places are still left for the ladies to conquer. At Mc-Connelisville three saloons were closed to-day, and the contents emptied into the Muskingum River. At Xonia up to to night 15 saloors have been closed, and several are expected to surrender to-morrow. The ladies are joyful over their success and gain new strength daily. At Nelsonville twelve liquor declars have proposed to stop selling or han ling liquor if the druggists will also agree to do it. They also ask that shipments to in-dividuals shall be prevented, and that nore but physicians shall keep liquor for prescriptions. At Jeffersonville, Fayotte Connty, all the saloons are closed but two. This is the last place in the county left for the ladies to subdue. Reports from the South say that the temperance revival has broken out at several points in Mississipi and Tennes-see, and it is believed it will soon reach Memplis. London, March 2 .- A despatch from Blackburn, Lancashire, brings the intelligence of a terrific boiler explosion causing a startling loss of life in that town to-day. Twenty persons were in-stantly killed and thirty injured. Many of the wounded were very badly hurt, and it is believed some will die.
