CANADIAN PACIFIC'S CROP REPORT

Winnipeg, Sept. 13—The Canadian Pacific Railway company crop report for the week ending Friday, Sept. 13, says:

"In Manitoba 80 to 95 per cent. of the wheat is cut and in some portions in the south it is completed. Threshing is general in most districts in the southern part. The weather during the past week was unfavorable but as many of the wet days was followed by bright sun and wind, recovery was quick and delay and damage was not great.

"In Saskatchewan 65 to 75 per cent. of the wheat is in stook and as high as 90 per cent in some districts on the Moose Mountain Partal

high as 90 per cent. in some districts on the Moose Mountain, Portal and Forward districts.

"In Southern Alberta from 85 to 90 per cent. of the wheat is cut and in the north from 35 to 50 per cent. Winter wheat cutting was completed last week. The quality of the crop is generally better than

last year.

"Oats are up to the average. Barley, though late, is a good crop and flax is much better than usual. There will be very little sign of 'flax wilt' this season."
