lay there for thirty-six hours, hoping and
praying that the stokers would shovel him
into the furnace and end his misery. They
couldn't work, and hired an old soldier who
was on board to work for them at \$1.25 a
day including the use of his bunk at night.
They paid 25c. for meals and ate 1 1/2 cents
worth at a sitting. They occasionally
found strength enough to raise their eye
lids and look out through the port holes,
and swear the waves were twice as high as
the boat, which would bring them about to
the top of the highest steeple in town. The
machinery of the boat got on the bum, and
she stopped several times each day to dance
on the waves, and play in the trough of the
sea. Partlow stepped on a nail which ran
clear through his foot, and Christie was
fired from his bunk by a big wave. He had
then been sick for three days, during which
time he cast up his accounts 27 times, and
was so thin and weak that he made no im-
pression on the thin curtain partition which
he was thrown against. They soon recovered
on reaching land and were anxious to get to
work and see whether they were going to
make money or tramp. They purpose to
return by way of Siberia, and Alaska over-
land route, in order to escape the ocean
voyage, and will wait at Behring straits
until the ice forms so they can walk over it.
