Years ago the custom of moving votes of thanks to retiring members of the City Council was carried to what was thought by many to be a ridiculous extreme, and some members determined to break up the habit once for all. "Years ago" does not mean a century in this case, because the affair happened about 1881. Still it is long enough ago to become ancient history. In those days an alderman, whether retiring voluntarily or because he was defeated at the polls, had recorded a motion expressing the esteem in which he had always been held, and setting forth his value as an alderman and the loss the city had sustained by his removal.
