#### PRIZE FOR THE CANADIANS.

The Chicago papers continue to praise Captain Hyman's London-Toronto eleven. Terry was the hero of today's game, the chief credit of the performance belongs to Terry, who fully sustained his reputation as the best bat in Canada. He was at the wicket for one hour and three-quarters, twice he hit Cumming over the pavilion, and, though in the middle of the inning he steered down, both the beginning and finish of his display were marked by class. Terry, who was batting a chance at the wicket, when he had made 61, the inning was without a mistake, and as he was several times hit by bumpy balls, his nerve cannot be gainsaid.

"Loring, the hero of Tuesday's game, completed a useful 25, and then played a ball into his wicket. Pope must have had the feeders hypnotized, as he hit twice he was missed by Munde at point and by Thompson in the slips. Encouraged by his good luck, he afterward hit in free fashion, and twice sent the ball clear over the fence into the lorton avenue. Walker, who so far has not done himself justice, was in evidence with a useful 19, and was splendidly caught by C. St. Paul. Boyd was the only one of the team to reach the coveted double figures, and then planted his leg where his bat should have been, and appeared satisfied that he was leg before wicket.

ful passing of what was really the first great act of Parliament elected after the Reform Bill of 1832. One hundred millions of dollars were appropriated to pay the cost of securing the freedom of the slaves. This, though an enormous amount of money, is a small sum compared with the cost of the civil war in the United States, which was the direct result of slavery. It is said that over six thousand millions of dollars were spent in this war. It is difficult to grasp the meaning of six thousand millions of dollars, an amount which, if divided amongst the people of Canada, would give over twelve hundred dollars to every man, woman and child in this great Dominion. In addition to the money expended, over half a million of lives were lost in the struggle. Jefferson, one of the fathers of the American Union, referring to slavery, said: "I tremble for my country when I remember that God is just. We might have trembled for our country, and how severe was the punishment inflicted upon her through this accursed slavery."

#### WORTHY OF FREEDOM.

"And now that this foul blot has been removed, it is gratifying to know that the freedmen have shown themselves to be worthy of their freedom. Many even of those who were formerly the slaves were suddenly setting at liberty whose rights had been so long trampled upon, and who had suffered so many indignities. His glad to see the result has proved that their fears were groundless. Nowhere can be found more peaceful and law-abiding citizens than amongst the British Crown people. Certainly the British Crown has no more loyal and dutiful subjects. (Applause.)"

#### "I will not venture to detain you longer. I am glad that you selected London as the place for your meeting. This western part of Ontario is specially interested in your welfare, as being the asylum where so many of your ancestors came for refuge when the time of distress was upon them, where no oppressed or hunted slave ever sought shelter in vain. (Cheers.)"

"Again I wish you a pleasant and successful festival. The simple programme has been prepared, and that one of the items is a marriage ceremony in the grand stand. I see many young folks here to whom this will be a pleasant recollection to the day that you were married under such happy circumstances in this beautiful Forest City. (Laughter and applause.)"

#### REV. R. L. HOLDEN.

Rev. R. L. Holden, Detroit, formerly of Chatham, followed. He appreciated the Government of Great Britain, he said, because when there was no place for the black man to hide—a place to be free from the scent of the bloodhound—when he got to Canada, the hounds could go no farther. The speaker came to Canada in 1860, and he said the day when the colored people could not walk the streets of London without having rocks thrown at them and being called "niggers" was a day that he would never forget. "Education and religion has come, and we can stand as men and women and go wherever we please." (Applause.) Continuing, the speaker said the colored people should be united, yet loyal to the country in which they lived. He dwelt on the course of pride, and pointed out that where dimensions existed prosperity could not enter. He was glad to see that the British flag would never fail to fly over Canada. (Applause.)

It was a beautiful country of beautiful people, and all the colored people wanted to be representative men. At the close of the speeches came THE SPORTS.
