"Boodle!"

Frank McVean's Sensational Story in the Box.

Says He Got \$40 to "Boodle" Eight Voters,

And Was Promised \$100, But Did Not Get It.

Judges Annoyed at the Absence of Witnesses.

Justice Ferguson Suggests a Warrant for an Alderman.

Their Lordships Decline to Sit All Summer.

Mr. Hellmuth Wants More Time to Collect Evidence—Mr. Osler Says He Is Going to Run His Case.

His Own Way—Mr. Toth's Funny Break.

Thursday Afternoon.

PATRICK McPHILLIPS, sworn, said he was a partner of Mr. Toth's. Their special duty was to prepare the evidence for the trial. He remembered Sullivan's visit. He denied Sullivan's story that he had taken only four dollars to make a declaration. During Sullivan's second visit he heard Sullivan ask Toth to pay him \$40, and \$3, which made \$43. What was Toth paying him money for? The lawful payments for that land were \$20. There had been \$20 paid. Sullivan had produced from his pocket a little list of the bandmen and the amounts paid them. It corresponded exactly with Mr. Toth's accounts. Three payments were made by Toth to Sullivan on June 18. Sullivan was entitled to only one payment. Why should Sullivan and his brother not be believed? Why should Toth be believed? There had been an attempt to terrorize John Sullivan in Toth's office. Toth had sent for Sullivan and attempted to bribe him by a statutory declaration. Mr. Osler strongly condemned this pernicious practice of solicitors, seeking to win cases by statutory declarations, when those witnesses were under subpoena. Toth's accounts were \$43. Toth's \$44 corresponded with the bribe. Look at the attempt made to discredit the witness. Look at the pole electrician; mere tavern talk, which could not influence their lordships. Mr. Osler strongly emphasized the fact that Toth had paid so many different payments to Sullivan.

Mr. Hellmuth said Mr. Osler had made a most unwarranted attack on a solicitor of the court. It was a case of manufactured evidence by those who were determined to win their point at all hazards. It was a par with the cigar box story, which Mr. Osler had abandoned.

Mr. Hellmuth said it was right for a solicitor to secure statutory declarations to protect his case. He attributed Sullivan's story to revenge for being thrown out of Mr. Toth's office.

Judge Ferguson—So you say the story of Sullivan is concocted?

Mr. Hellmuth—Yes.

Judge Ferguson—It is an embarrassing position for a judge to be in.

MR. OSLER WON'T TRUCKLE.

Mr. Osler said with regard to Mr. Toth's testimony that it would be a poor day for the court if barristers had to truckle to professional men. He said that Sullivan's oath was just as sacred to him as Toth's. We are told we are not to take Sullivan's word, because he took the oath at the polls. Why, my lords, Mr. Toth took the oath at the polls.
