> Battle in Progress Sixteen Miles from Ladysmith.

Boers Claim to Have Captured a British Camp Near Mefeking-Free State Troops Commenced the Hostilities at Ladysmith.

ZULUS WANT TO BE IN IT. Ladysmith, Natal, Oct. 17-Delayed.-A native tribe in Zululand, whose cattle had been raided by Boers, applied to Gen. Sir George Stewart White, the British commander in Natal, for permission to make armed resistance. Gen White refused their request, as he is opposed to the use of colored auxiliar ies in the coming struggle.

According to a special dispatch from Natal, the Zulus are arming with as segais. Chief Dinizulu says he is un able to restrain them. It is expected they will be joined by the Swazis. The Basutos are said to manifest an attitude hostile to the Boers, and they may neutralize a certain number of

the Boer forces. BATTLE IN PROGRESS. Ladysmith, Oct. 18-5:25 p.m.-The British forces came into contact with the enemy in the neighborhood of Acton Homes and Lesters Station about 16 miles out, this morning. The firing began at 10 o'clock. The British cav-alry patrols have been in action at Acton Homes and Lesters Station since midday and the action is still in progress. A number of casualties have been reported. Supports are leaving the camp and expect to fight tomorrow.

ADVANCE OF THE BOERS. The war office has issued the following statement: News has been received from Gen.Sir George Stewart White, the general commanding in Natal, that the anticipated movement of Boer forces across the Drakensburg, already reported from several quarters, was likely to be continued on Oct. 17, in which case some of them might be expected to arrive at Boaan Bank that night, and probably to come into contact with our cavalry between Lady-mith and the passes of the Drakens-burg. On the north the Boer forces from Ingagene are advancing, accompanied by a few batteries of artillery. On the Buffalo River the Boers from Veryheid are moving toward Vant's and Rork's drifts. Our cavalry remain in observation and report movements in the Orange Free State.

THROUGH BOER CHANNELS. London, Oct. 18 .- A special dispatch, dated Pretoria, at noon, yesterday, says: After a few shots were fired at Mafeking, the white flag was hoisted. A Boer party bearing a flag of truce was sent to inquire whether the town surrendered. No definite reply was received. The burgher messenger was detained for six hours and then released. Pretoria. Oct. 16.—Delayed.—The Boers continue to close in upon Mafeking and to destroy the railway north and south of the town. Among the prisoners captured at Lobatsi was the Rev. Adrian Hofmeyer. He has since

been released. Another special dispatch from Pre-toria says: The Boer Krupp batteries are now covering the town, Military engineers can be observed laying a temporary railroad, which will probably be used in armored train defense

by the garrison. CAPTURED A BRITISH CAMP. Lorenzo Marquez, Oct.18.-The Volkssten, the Boer official organ at Pretoria, gives the following account of the occupation of the British camp at Ramathlabama, just north of Mafeking "The British camp at Ramathlabama has been captured and sacked by Gen Cronje after severe fighting. Many burghers were killed or wounded. The British loss is not known,

The Volkssten adds that "success has thus far everywhere attended the burghers," although it admits that in the various skirmishes near Mafeking and at other points the Boer casualties number some 60 or 70 killed and wound-MANY MULES FOR THE ARMY.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 18 .- Twentyfive carloads of mules for the Trans vaal, purchased in this market by the English government within the last ten days, were started for New Orleans today. Another train will follow for the same point in a few days. An estimate on 500 tons of hay for use in the South African campaign was made yesterday.

New Orleans, Oct. 18.-Three more English transports have arrived here to take the shipment of mules to Cape Town for the use of the British army in the Transvazi. The shipments are being seriously interrupted by the Texas quarantine.

#### **FACE TO FACE**

Enemy's Scouts Almost in Touch With Glencoe Outposts.

Ladysmith, Oct. 18.—It is stated the enemy's scouts are almost in touch with the outposts at Glencoe. The British are working around both sides, with the idea of getting south of Ladysmith, and attacking in force, with the co-operation of Commandant-General Joubert. At Glencoe the British patrol covered a wide area in order to pre-vent outflanking, and were subject to a hot fire in persistent skirmishes.Gen. Sir Stewart White is quite prepared to offer battle, and the camp is pleased at the prospect of striking a definite blow. BRITISH AT MAFEKING HOLD-

ING THEIR OWN. There is still no authentic news from Mafeking, but all reports tend to con-finm the belief that Col. Baden-Powell is polding his own, and no credit is given to the vague rumor that a flag of truce had been displayed.

Big Fight in Prospect. A considerable engagement is anticipated in the vicinity of Ladysmith today. The combined advance of Boers and Free State troops in this direction has been executed with not inconsiderable skill, and shows a clear appreciation of the British position.

SATISFACTORY SETTLEMENT. Berlin, Oct. 18 .- Baron Speck Von Sternburg, German member of the Samoan international commission, paid 2 prolonged visit to the United States embassy today. After the commission-er had withdrawn, United States Am-bassador White said to a representative of the Associated Press: "The work of the joint commission has been thoroughly well done. Not only has it accomplished the restoration of peace in the islands, but it has removed all ill-feeling between Berlin, Washington and London, thus paving a way for more permanent arrangements by the powers concerned. Negotiations have now been set on foot, which, doubt-less, will result in an arrangement insuring peace in the islands and safeguarding the interests of the three powers. Of the exact nature of the proposals, it is yet too early to speak. All I should say is that the discussion is oceeding in the best possible spirit

DEATH-DEALING STORMS. Rome, Oct. 18.-Serious storms, accompanied by floods, prevail in the southern districts of Italy, working widespread damage. At Sangiorgie, a bridge and twenty houses have been swept away, and it is believed that there has been considerable loss of life there. At Monte-Mesola, a church was struck by lightning during mass, three persons being killed and forty other more or less seriously injured.

A \$500,000 FIRE. London, Oct. 18 .- The wholesale confectionery works of Barrett & Co. in this city were burned out this morning. The damage is estimated at \$500,000.

NORWAY'S INDEPENDENCE. Christiania. Oct. 18.-In the storthing, the Leftists adopted an electoral programme, declaring, first that Norway's independence would be recognized by appointment of a separate minister of foreign affairs and the establishment of a separate consul in system; second, that arbitration and neutrality should be recognized; and, third, that a system of insurance against incapacity to earn a livelihood should be applied to the whole Norwegian people.

A DREYFUS DUEL. Paris, Oct. 18.—A. Godier, writer of leading articles for the Dreyfusard organ Aurore, fought a duel today with the son of Gen. Mercier, former minister of war. M. Mercier was pinked in the chest, but is not thought to be
