Gen. White Opposed to the Use of Colored Auxiliaries.

Battle in Progress Sixteen Miles from Ladysmith.

Boers Claim to Have Captured a British Camp Near Mafeking—Free State Troops Commenced the Hostilities at Ladysmith.

That white flag. A letter was brought to the British pockets at Ladysmith by Boer cyclists bearing a white flag, signed by the Newcastle magistrate, and sent in by permission of Commandant-General Joubert, stating that the Britishers who remained in Newcastle are all well.

BOERS NEAR GLENCOE
Camp Glencoe, Natal, Oct. 18, 2 p.m.—Boer scouts have been sighted at Haring Spruit, seven miles from the British camp, and an engagement is imminent.

SEARCHED FOR GOLD.
Lorenzo Marques, Oct. 18.—The last of the leading Randites and managers of the gold fields and of the Eckstein, Robinson and Champ D'Or mines, together with a body of engineers, arrived here today. They report that they were searched for gold at the frontier by the Boers.

ENLISTING IN TEXAS.
San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 18.—The Express today says: An agent for the British Government is enlisting British subjects eligible for duty in the British first reserves for the war in South Africa. He proposes to form a regiment of Scots, and the first detachment of 300 men will rendezvous here on Thursday, and leave via the Mallory Line from Galveston on Friday for New York. The men are to receive \$500 bounty. They sail from New York, and will be organized into a command on their arrival at Cape Town.

ADVANCE OF THE BOERS.
The war office has issued the following statement: News has been received from Gen. Sir George Stewart White, the general commanding in Natal, that the anticipated movement of Boer forces across the Drakensburg, already reported from several quarters, was likely to be continued on Oct. 17, in which case some of them might be expected to arrive at Eosank Bank that night, and probably to come into contact with our cavalry between Ladysmith and the passes of the Drakensburg. On the north the Boer forces from Ingagane are advancing, accompanied by a few batteries of artillery. On the Buffalo River the Boers from Vryheid are moving toward Van's and Rork's drifts. Our cavalry remain in observation and report movements in the Orange Free State.

THROUGH BOER CHANNELS.
London, Oct. 18.—A special dispatch, dated Pretoria, at noon, yesterday, says: After a few shots were fired at Mafeking, the white flag was hoisted. A Boer party bearing a flag of truce was sent to inquire whether the town surrendered. No definite reply was received. The burgher messenger was detained for six hours and then released.

PRETORIA, Oct. 18.—Delayed.—The Boers continue to close in upon Mafeking and to destroy the railway north and south of the town. Among the prisoners captured at Lobatse was the Rev. Adrian Hofmeyer. He has since been released.

Another special dispatch from Pre-
toria says: The Boer Krupp batteries are now covering the town. Military engineers can be observed laying a temporary railroad, which will probably be used in an armored train defense by the garrison.

CAPTURED A BRITISH CAMP.
Lorenzo Marques, Oct. 18.—The Volks-stem, the Boer official organ at Pretoria, gives the following account of the occupation of the British camp at Ramatlabama, just north of Mafeking: "The British camp at Ramatlabama has been captured and sacked by Gen. Cronje after severe fighting. Many burghers were killed or wounded. The British loss is not known."

thus far everywhere attended the
burghers, although it admits that in the various skirmishes near Mafeking and at other points the Boer casualties number some 60 or 70 killed and wounded.

MANY MULES FOR THE ARMY.
Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 18.—Twenty-five carloads of mules for the Transvaal, purchased in this market by the English government within the last ten days, were started for New Orleans today. Another train will follow for the same point in a few days. An estimate on 500 tons of hay for use in the South African campaign was made yesterday.

New Orleans, Oct. 18.—Three more
English transports have arrived here to take the shipment of mules to Cape Town for the use of the British army in the Transvaal. The shipments are being seriously interrupted by the Texas quarantine.

The Montezuma will leave on Friday
with 2,000 mules; the Corinthian will have 1,200 mules next week, and the Euronis about the same number on Nov. 1. Two other vessels are expected, which, it is thought, will carry all the mules needed by the British government for service in South Africa.

PARDONED.
Paris, Oct. 18.—President Loubet today signed the pardon for Emil Arton, who in November, 1898, was sentenced to eight years' imprisonment for complicity with Baron De Renach and Dr. Cornelius Herz in the frauds on the Panama Canal Company.

SATISFACTORY SETTLEMENT.
Berlin, Oct. 18.—Baron Speck von Sternburg, German member of the Samoan international commission, paid a prolonged visit to the United States embassy today. After the commissioner had withdrawn, United States Ambassador White said to a representative of the Associated Press: "The work of the joint commission has been thoroughly well done. Not only has it accomplished the restoration of peace in the islands, but it has removed all ill-feeling between Berlin, Washington and London, thus paving a way for more permanent arrangements by the powers concerned. Negotiations have now been set on foot, which, doubtless, will result in an arrangement insuring peace in the islands and safeguarding the interests of the three powers. Of the exact nature of the proposals, it is yet too early to speak. All I should say is that the discussion is proceeding in the best possible spirit."

DEATH-DEALING STORMS.
Rome, Oct. 18.—Serious storms, accompanied by floods, prevail in the southern districts of Italy, working widespread damage. At Sangro, a bridge and twenty houses have been swept away, and it is believed that there has been considerable loss of life there. At Monte-Mesola, a church was struck by lightning during mass, three persons being killed and forty others more or less seriously injured.

A \$500,000 FIRE.
London, Oct. 18.—The wholesale confectionery works of Bland & Co. in this city were burned out this morning. The damage is estimated at \$500,000.

NORWAY'S INDEPENDENCE.
Christiania, Oct. 18.—In the storming, the Leftists adopted an electoral programme, declaring that Norway's independence would be recognized by appointment of a separate minister of foreign affairs and the establishment of a separate consul in system; second, that arbitration and neutrality should be recognized; and, third, that a system of insurance against incapacity to earn a livelihood should be applied to the whole Norwegian people.

A DREYFUS DUEL.
Paris, Oct. 18.—A. Godier, writer of leading articles for the Dreyfusard organ, L'Aurore, fought a duel today with the son of Gen. Mercier, former minister of war. M. Mercier was plucked in the chest, but is not thought to be seriously hurt.

CHATHAM AROUSED

Mass Meeting Held in Tecumseh Park
