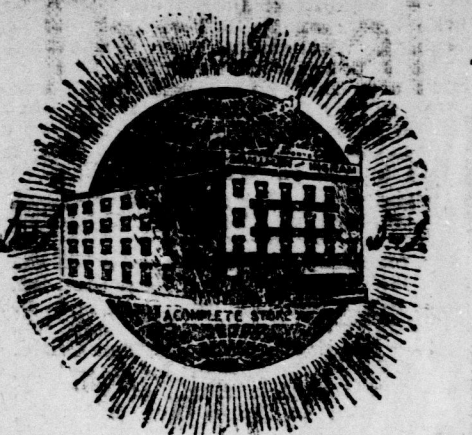

CONSERVATIVE FEUD

Mr. Robert Birmingham Writes to Sir Charles Tupper.

Toronto, May 26.—A paragraph in yesterday morning's World, under the caption, "Putting the Pistol to Sir Charles Tupper's Head," reads as follows:

"There is something that all Conservatives should know at the present moment, and that is that Mr. Robert Birmingham, late Conservative organizer, wrote a letter this week to Sir Charles Tupper, to the effect that if certain claims of his were not conceded he (Mr. Birmingham) would move to have the conduct of the Conservatives in the elections of 1887 and 1888 investigated at the same time that the machine of the Liberals is inquired into by Sir Wilfrid Laurier's proposed commission."

Mr. Robert Birmingham, when interviewed by a Globe representative last evening, admitted that he had made certain representations to Sir Charles, and that unless justice was done the speaker there would be a good deal of unpleasantness. The trouble, Mr. Birmingham said, had arisen over the question of the organizers. The attempt was being made to injure him in the interest of a certain faction in the Conservative party, and the matter had now reached a crisis.
