THE ROD.
Cabin V. Graves, Natural Bridge, Jefferson county, New York, has produced the novelty of the season in the shape of a "Protected Live Fish Bait." By means of a transparent tube or receptacle, live bait, including minnows, crabs, frogs, angle worms, shrimp or the like, while presented in a magnified form to the fish, desired to be caught by the hook attached, is safe from injury being bitten. The bait is kept alive for a whole day, and one is all that is necessary. It is destined to revolutionize fishing. The owner will send No. 1 bait for \$1.00, No. 2, for \$1.25; No. 3, for \$1.50. No. 1 catches large-sized fish, such as cod, mackerels and salmon trout; No. 2, black fish, pike and pickerel; No. 3, mackerel and black bass.

BASEBALL.
THE ONTARIO AMATEUR ASSOCIATION.
Toronto, April 3.—A largely attended meeting of men was held here to-day with a view of forming an association of amateur clubs for the Province. Those present were unanimous in favor of a league in the same basis as the lacrosse association. The Province will be divided into districts with one central body. All clubs will be compelled to play amateur players.

The following officers were elected: Honorary president, Geo. Sleeman, Guelph; president, J. J. Ward, Toronto; first vice, Dr. Bremas, Peterboro; second vice, John Stacey, St. Thomas; secretary-treasurer, Col. Davis, Hamilton.
A council was appointed, including Messrs. M. Kennedy, G. B. Smith, W. H. Simpson, J. Manly, C. M. Gill, J. McWeeney, R. Stacey, J. McGarry, J. B. Cummings and T. E. McClellan. This council will arrange the grouping of clubs and form the different leagues into one association.

Late Canadian News

Big Booty Secured by a Thieving Jewellery Clerk—A Costly Surveying Expedition.

Monday being a public holiday, the Government departments at Ottawa were closed.

It is estimated that the cut of lumber at Rat Portage this season will be 80,000,000 feet.

Over 4,000 people assembled at Schermer Park, Montreal, Monday afternoon to see J. J. Corbett, the pugilist.

The shareholders of the Winnipeg Waterworks Company offer to sell out to the city council for \$400,000.

Robert T. Wallace, postmaster at Woodbridge, died suddenly Monday evening of pneumonia, age 41 years.

The Salvation Army will hold a grand celebration in Montreal April 6, 7 and 9 to commemorate the 16th anniversary of the invasion of Canada by the army.

Mr. N. J. S. Laroche, merchant, at Theford mines, and son of Mr. Leo Laroche, merchant, of St. Henry, has died from injuries received while trying to board a moving train.

Attention is drawn to the fact that Parliament did not present Lord Stanley, the retiring Governor-General, with a farewell address before prorogation, as was the case on the occasion of the departure of his predecessors.

Prof. King, chief astronomer of the Interior Department, who will represent Canada on the International Commission to determine the boundary between Alaska and British Columbia, starts for Victoria on Thursday. His party will number nearly 100. The work will occupy two years and \$150,000 has been appropriated for the purpose.

A young German named Albert Seligman, employed as clerk by Mr. Joseph Medels, Lanark, went to bed as usual in Mr. Medels's dwelling, Friday night, and after all was quiet got up and stole Mrs. Medels's jewelry (valued at over \$400), a coat belonging to Mr. Medels's, two ladies' gold watches, seven silver watches, a number of watch chains, rings and other articles and over \$200 in cash.

QUIETLY SETTLED.

The Imperial Loan Company Defalcations Reached \$30,000.

TORONTO, April 3.—The story of the Imperial Loan and Investment Company defalcations is coming out gradually. The defalcations are alleged to have been going on for over two years and, according to the books, aggregate over \$30,000. The friends of the parties have, however, settled matters, and there will be no criminal proceedings.

The English debenture account has been the medium through which some of the leakages have been discovered.

THE PORT STANLEY TRAGEDY.

Continuation of the Coroner's Inquest in the Case of Mrs. Sifton's Death.

PORT STANLEY, March 3.—The adjourned inquest to inquire into the cause of the death of the late Mrs. Sifton on the morning of March 30, was resumed to-day. Several witnesses testified that there was ample time and willing hands to have saved Mrs. Sifton after Orme's house caught fire, had anyone known she was in the house, but no one knew she was there except the Orme family, and the evidence went to show that the son was excited; that he forgot his mother, who was generally kept fastened in a small room upstairs, the fastening being a hook on the outside of the door. Deceased was of unsound mind and had been in an asylum prior to her removal to her son's here, and although she has been an inmate of Mr. Orme's house for a year, very few people knew it. The inquest adjourned to meet again on Friday, April 7.

THE LATE MRS. MACKENZIE.

Funeral Services at Toronto—The Remains Conveyed to Sarnia.

TORONTO, April 3.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Mackenzie, widow of ex-Premier Alex. Mackenzie, took place from the residence, St. Albans street, this afternoon at 1 o'clock. Rev. Dr. Thomas, pastor of Jarvis Street Baptist Church, conducted a short service at the house. The funeral procession was afterwards formed and the remains taken to the Union Station to be borne to Sarnia, where interment will take place tomorrow from the residence of Mr. Charles Mackenzie, M.P.P., brother of the late Alexander Mackenzie.

The following were pall-bearers: Sir O. Mowat, Hon. G. W. Ross, Wm. Buckingham (Stratford), Robert Jaffray, Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., Major Greig, J. L. Blaikie, Mortimer Clark, Q.C.
The chief mourners were Mr. Charles Mackenzie, Dr. Thompson, of Sarnia, son-in-law of the deceased, and the deceased's brother, Mr. Simms.
