New York, Jan. 31.—Rumors were expressing sorrow at the death of Queen Victoria and of congratulation on the accession of King Edward current late last night in London, says once. There was a crowded attendance, Lord Rosebery, remarking that he would pass lightly over the congratulatory part of the programme, said his majesty's speech at the privy council meeting had sufficiently indicated the laws by which he intended his reign should be governed, thus promising to make his rule no less illustrious than that of his parent. Lord Rosebery then dwelt in eloquent terms on the life and death of Queen Victoria, saying that in the whole history of mankind no death had so touched such a large number of persons in the entire world. There was scarcely an intelligent individual in the civilized world, but was profoundly moved. He wondered if her subjects yet realized how much they had lost and what an enormous weight the Queen had in the councils of the world. It was not brilliancy or genius which could supply the advantage she gave Great Britain by her fund of knowledge, which was unequaled by any constitutional historian. ## Funeral Arrangements.

A GORGEOUS PAGEANT.

The procession in London, as indicated by the war office orders, will be a gorgeous military pageant. Detachments of 40 regiments, with an almost equal number of distinctive uniforms, embracing all arms of the service, will make a constantly changing picture. tion to the brilliant entourages of the visiting kings and princely envoys, there will be the military attachees of the embassies and legations. All the field marshals of the British army able to endure the fatigue will ride with their staffs. The naval corps will also take part in the procession, which will be two miles long. The war office directs that Beethoven's and Chopin's funeral marches only shall be played. From the time the coffin reaches London to its departure guns will boom

slowly in Hyde Park. WARSHIPS GATHERING.

The warships are assembling for Friday's great naval pageant. The arrangements provide that eight torpedo destroyers will lead the procession from Cowes, followed by the royal yacht Alberta, with the Queen's body on board. The royal yacht Vic-toria and Albert, with King Edward and Queen Alexandra and the English royal family; the royal yacht Osborne, with other royalties; the imperial yacht Hohenzollern, with Emperor William, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and others; the admiralty yacht Enchantress and a Trinity House yacht with the officials on

The main squadron of battleships cruisers will be moored two and a half cables apart, in one line ex-tending from Cowes to Spithead. The channel fleet, under the command of Vice-Admiral Sir Harry Holdsworth Rawson, will form the eastern por-tion, and the reserve fleet, under Rear Admiral Sir Gerard Henry Noel, will

form the western portion. The foreign war vessels are to be moored southwest of the British ships, in the order of their arrival, alongside of them will be m moored eight British gunboats-the Antelope, Gleaner, Skipjack, Leda, Rattlesnake, Alert, Circe and Speedwell. After leaving Trinity pier, the Alberta, with her attendant escort will steam along the deep channel between the coast of of Wight and the single line of battleships and cruisers.

The main line will be as follows, be-

ginning at Cowes: Alexandra, Camperdown, Rodney, Benbow, Collingwood, Colossus, Sans Pareil, Nile, Howe, Me-lampus, Severn, Galatea, Bellona, Pactolus, Pekorus, Diana, Conqueror, rogant, Minerva, Niobe, Hero, Hood, Trafalgar, Resolution, Jupiter, Hannibal, Mars, Prince George and Majestic. On arrival at Portsmouth the royal yachts will remain in the harbor that night. Minute guns will be fired by all the ships in the Solent and at Cowes, commencing when the Alberta leaves the pier. Each ship will be directed to cease firing immediately after the tail of the procession has passed her. After the procession has passed the Majestic the forts and ships in Portsmouth harbor will continue firing minute guns, and continue firing until the Alberta is alongside the wharf. No standards will be displayed, and ensigns and Union Jacks will be at half-mast. No National Anthem will be played. On the approach of the procession the ships will be manned

Toronto, Jan. 30.-The government of Ontario last night issued a proclamation appointing Saturday "a public holiday to be observed as a day of general mourning by all persons throughout our Province of Ontario." This settles all doubt as to the legal position on Saturday.
