46 PERISHED!

As a Result of Two Fires in India--Others Fatally Burned.

Bombay, May 2.—Thirty-five out of forty-two persons who were working at a cotton press at Amreli, on the Kattiyar peninsula, have been burned to death. The remainder were fatally burned.

A similar fire has occurred at Khamgaon, Province of Berar, resulting in the death of eleven persons.

BOER RAIDERS DRIVEN BACK!

The Enemy Still Alive on the Borders of Cape Colony.

They Lose Their Last Long Tom--Grenfell Puts the Burghers to Flight.

Cape Town, May 2.—Commandant Malan, after a skirmish with Col. Henricker's Victorians, in which the burghers are said to have suffered somewhat, retreated with the purpose of joining Scheepers' command in West Caledon. They were driven back, however, by the Cape Mounted Riflemen into Waterkloof. The British casualties were one killed and one wounded.

LOST THEIR LAST LONG TOM.
London, May 1.—A dispatch from Lord Kitchener, dated from Pretoria today, says:

"Grenfell attacked the Boers at Bergplant, near Halverster, where the last Long Tom opened fire at 10,000 yards. Kitchener's scouts advanced to within 3,000 yards, when the gun was blown up and the Boers fled. Ten of them were made prisoners."

"Other columns report 10 Boers killed, 6 wounded, 6 made prisoners and 60 surrendered, and 20,000 rounds of ammunition captured. The British had 4 killed and 7 wounded."

ATTACKED BY BOERS.
Cape Town, April 30.—Sir Gordon Sprigg, the premier of Cape Colony, reports that eleven members of the Western Province Rifles were attacked by 90 Boers near Brandvlei. Two were killed, three wounded, and the remainder were captured.

The Boers in the neighborhood of the Kendhardt district of Cape Colony are actively engaged in removing supplies to various laagers.

Commandant Krivitzinger's commando is being very closely followed by the British. The main body, estimated to number 500, was engaged by Col. Crewe's column near Gelfenfontein, and is being driven towards the Orange River.

Boer raiding and looting parties are reported to be in the Richmond, Mur-

rayburg and Middleburg, Cape Colony districts.

The Boer prisoners now number 17, 953.

CANADIAN MOUNTED RIFLES' PAY.

London, May 2.—In the House of Commons, the Hon. Seymour Fitzroy Ormsby Gore, M. P. for the Gallopborough division of Lincolnshire, was informed by Lord Stanley, financial secretary of the war office, in reply to a question in regard to the arrears in pay to the Canadian Mounted Rifles, that the men returning with unadjusted balances due, received 61 days' pay, or five pounds. Where the claims exceeded these amounts four-fifths of the amount of the claim was paid.

Lord Stanley stated that the general officer commanding the lines of communication had been instructed to make every endeavor to facilitate the adjustment of accounts in South Africa.

BRITISH USE BOER TACTICS.

Pretoria, May 2.—The British troops, who have come to understand the sniping tactics of the Boers at isolated points, and the danger thereof, are now adopting the same methods. Boer snipers have recently been raiding cattle in all directions, and have outwitted a number of British commands.

At Johannesburg four miles from Johannesburg recently hid in the long grass near where cattle were grazing, and waited for four days for the burghers to appear. The Boers came down and commenced to drive the cattle away, when the British disclosed themselves and opened fire. The Boers then fled, leaving two wounded on the field.

MURDER IN TRANSVAAL.

Cape Town, May 2.—A European woman, her son, and a native servant have been mysteriously murdered at Waterval Boven, Transvaal. The woman's skull was fractured, the son's breast was shattered, and the servant had been shot. The house bore evidence of a terrible struggle. Nothing had been stolen.

WHERE SMALLPOX IS PREVALENT!

In Different Parts of Ontario—Some 500 Cases Reported—Infection Spread at a Dance.

Toronto, May 2.—According to the latest returns received smallpox exists in the following centers in Ontario: Little Current, Batchewana, Stobie Mine, Copper Cliff, Blind River, Thessalon, Sudbury, London, London township, Cramble township, Haldimand township, Collingwood, Cay township, Carleton township, Toronto, York township, Mattawatchan township, Admaston, McNab, Griffiths township, Bagot township, Pembroke, Nipissing, North Bay, East Claire, and the township of Beachville, Swearby, Waterloo township, Lakefield. The Lakefield outbreak brings the total number in Ontario during the past four months to about 500.

Dr. Bryce says: "I have no doubt that there will be a recurrence of the epidemic of smallpox and we must guard against it. Cleveland has 600 cases. Buffalo must expect to get her share, and when the Pan-American is in full swing there will be a very large number of people coming to it over here. Get vaccinated, that is my advice." The small-pox epidemic has now increased to the stage which has caused Dr. Bryce and the Provincial officers to draw strong conclusions from figures. They deal a very heavy blow to the opponents of vaccination, in running over the returns. Dr. Bryce pointed out that in Toronto Junction all vaccinated persons escaped with but one exception. On the other hand, none of those who were attacked by smallpox had been vaccinated, except one person, who had a very mild attack.

"In the back townships, where the disease has been most rampant, the authorities have found that only a small per cent of the people have been vaccinated. In forty centers of smallpox, containing 500 cases, six have terminated fatally. North, some 5,000 people passed through official hands on the trains, of whom about half were vaccinated. Three hundred and thirty were dealt with at the Sudbury camp, where the outbreak is now completely under control. The work has now narrowed down to disinfected houses, and those disinfecting the houses. The train inspection has been stopped."

Dr. Bryce has just returned from Carden township, "Victoria," where the latest outbreak occurred. Seventeen cases are in the hands of the authorities. The extent of the outbreak during the last week, that a big dance was held, at which all the victims were present.

MACHINISTS OUT!

Struck at Buffalo for a Nine-Hour Day.

The Strike a Forerunner of Movement to Be Inaugurated May 20—Concessions Made.
