Hay and Straw—Over 500 loads on sale, and as a consequence the sales dropped about 50c to 41 per cent, selling mostly at \$9 to \$10 per ton. The demand is fair. Straw is scarce, at \$6 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—In fair supply, with no change in prices. Apples—The high prices asked have decreased the demand; sales are slow, at prices asked and quoted.

Vegetables—Very little in the majority offered were held by dealers; no change in prices. Dressed Hogs—Quite a lot in, selling at \$7.50 to \$7.75 per cwt.

Cattle—Was in small supply, with prices about the same as on Saturday. Live Hogs—A carload of live hogs were shipped from here yesterday; \$7.75 per cwt. was paid.

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## LOST WITH CREW OF TWENTY MEN

British Steamer Thought to Have Foundered.

Wreckage and Life Buoys From the Tiber Found Near Halifax.

Halifax, March 4.—The British steamer Tiber, from Louisbourg, B. C., for Halifax, with a cargo of coal, is thought to have foundered with her captain and crew of twenty men. She left Louisbourg Wednesday afternoon and should have arrived here on Thursday night, as the run is only 170 miles. Today at the western entrance to Whitehead harbor fishermen picked up a steamer's house with pieces of deck plank attached, and fishermen at Port Felix have secured a large wheel, articles of furniture and one side of a ship's boat. They also saw wreckage drifting about the bay. Tonight the owners of the steamer received word from Goldboro, Guysborough county, that life buoys bearing the name "Tiber" had been found there.
