ment to make certain changes in the tariff that the manufacturers were under the impression that they were the only class in the country. And as a matter of fact, the manufacturers had been asked to submit a sample tariff of what they wanted to the Government, but they could not agree on the iron interests, and the tariff had not been submitted. The tariff issue between the two parties was marked. Mr. Borden's tariff was said to be a tariff of "adequate and full protection," which meant that they should not buy from any foreigner. Great Britain as well as the United States was barred out by it. And this further meant that you could not sell, because if you buy from no one, it is hardly likely they will buy from you. Then there was the tariff of the Liberal party, which had made the country prosperous, contented, happy and progressive. Although the preferential tariff was run down by the Conservatives, it was this tariff initiated by Premier Laurier, which had given Hon. Joseph Chamberlain his idea for a preferential trade within the empire.

Now if we are to have Mr. Borden's "adequate" tariff where will we be if Mr. Chamberlain comes to Canada and says, "What can you give us in return for a preferential trade with the mother country?" If the time ever comes when such a question is put to Canada by the motherland, we should be in a position to make a business bargain with the old land, and make a fiscal arrangement which will benefit all classes in Canada. But the Borden tariff would deal with the expenditure of Canada. ASAM RECALLED ON A SOUND BASIS

Former Grand Vizier of Persia to Again Take Office.

New York, Jan. 30.—His excellency All Adghar Khan Atabek Asam, wealthiest of Persians, and until four months ago the grand vizier of his country, will sail today for Europe. He has just arrived here from the west, and is said to have been summoned home by a cablegram from the Shah to again take office.

His excellency's reason for leaving Teheran last September, is somewhat wrapped in mystery, but it is apparent that he temporarily fell from power and found it advisable to leave the country without delay. Leaving Persia, he traveled via Russia, Korea, and San Francisco. Speaking of the Russian-Japanese trouble, he said: "War would be most unfortunate for both nations. When the Japanese ministers asked me for my opinion I advised them strongly to make every possible effort to end the trouble by diplomatic means."
