

CRIPPEN AND WOMAN TRAPPED ON DECK OF LINER MONTROSE BOTH CLOSE TO COLLAPSE

Inspector Dew Boards the Steamer at Father Point Disguised As a Pilot and Arrests Couple While Promenading On Deck—The Physician Shows Great Fear When Arrested and Miss Leneve Becomes Hysterical.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Father Point, Que., July 31.—Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard, with Canadian officers, boarded the steamer Montrose at 10 o'clock this morning, and Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve were immediately identified and placed under arrest. Crippen made no resistance.

Father Point, Que., July 31.—The world-wide search for Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, wanted in London in connection with the murder of his wife, formerly Belle Elmore, a variety actress, came to an end this morning when "Rev. Mr. Robinson and son," the passengers on the C. P. R. steamship Montrose, from Liverpool, suspected of being Dr. Crippen and his stenographer, Miss Leneve, proved to be the persons wanted, and were promptly placed under arrest.

WERE PROMENADING DECK.

The Montrose arrived off Father Point at 8:30 a. m., when Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard, with Chief McCarthy and ex-Chief Denis, of the provincial police, went out to her in the pilot's boat, as pilots. Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve were promenading the deck with Dr. Stewart, of the Montrose, when the rowboat came alongside. Dr. Crippen asked why there should be so many pilots, and Dr. Stewart replied they were probably pilots off duty returning to their homes.

The supposed pilots walked along the deck until they passed where Crippen, the girl, and Dr. Stewart were promenading. When Inspector Dew had a good look at the two, he gave the agreed-upon sign, and Chief McCarthy and Constable Denis at once arrested both Crippen and the girl and took them down to their own cabin, where they are now confined in custody of Inspector Dew.

CRIPPEN TURNED PALE.

Not fifteen minutes elapsed from the time the constables went aboard with Dew until the arrest was effected. Crippen turned pale as death, and his voice gurgled some unintelligible sound as he was hurried below, while Miss Leneve became hysterical.

When the arrests had been made, a signal was given to the steam tender Eureka, lying some distance off, by the whistle of the Montrose, and the tender came alongside, enabling the press representatives and photographers connected with the press to board the Montrose and proceed with her to Quebec, where the vessel will arrive about midnight tonight.

Father Point, July 31.—Dr. Hawley Crippen and Ethel Clara Leneve, his stenographer, who fled from London after the disappearance of Belle Elmore, the doctor's wife, were arrested here today, aboard the Canadian Pacific liner Montrose, at the command of Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard.

The Climax.

The identification of the fugitives by the English detective marked the culmination of one of the most sensational flights in recent criminal annals. Accompanied by two Canadian officers, he boarded the vessel at 8:30 this morning, and fifteen minutes later both man and girl were locked in their staterooms. Crippen, broken in spirits, but mentally relieved by the relaxed tension, the girl, garbed in boy's clothing, sobbing hysterically. They were no longer the Rev. John Robinson and son, as booked from Antwerp, on July 20.

Going Back Thursday.

After a brief delay, the Montrose continued her 160-mile journey up the river towards Quebec, where jail awaits the pair. Crippen is charged with the murder of an unknown woman. The girl is held as an accessory. They will be taken back to England on the steamship Royal George, leaving Quebec on Thursday.

A Dramatic Scene.

The scene enacted near the little settlement this morning was dramatic. Inspector Dew had spent a sleepless night at the Marconi operator's side communicating through the fog with the Montrose.

At 4:30 a. m. the approaching ship's whistle was heard. It awakened the villagers and the newspapermen, who dressed hastily and waited in a drizzling rain for the liner's arrival. Shortly after 7:30 o'clock the Montrose pushed her nose through the fog and at 8:15 the pilot boat Eureka set out from shore. She carried a host of newspapermen and photographers and as many townspeople as could be loaded on. But Inspector Dew was not among them. He had embarked on the Eureka's small tender, accompanied by Chief McCarthy, of the Quebec police, and Ex-Chief Denis, of the same city.

Passed as Pilot.

All wore the garb of pilots, and over his florid face, Inspector Dew had pulled a pilot's visored cap. He did not wish Crippen to recognize him before he could approach and take advantage of the only avenue of escape—suicide. Four sailors quietly rowed the tender alongside the Montrose and Dew and his companions stepped aboard.

Crippen Very Nervous.

Crippen was standing near the rail,

CRIPPEN AND COMPANION JAILED WHEN STEAMER REACHED QUEBEC

Probably Be Deported and Rushed Back to England Thursday—Girl's Relatives Believe She Has Been Hypnotized.

Quebec, Que., July 31.—The steamer Montrose, of the C. P. R. line, arrived in port from London about 12:30 o'clock this morning. In spite of the late hour there was a large crowd at the landing at the commissioner's wharf anxiously waiting for the arrival of Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve. The prisoners were in charge of Chief McCarthy, of the provincial police, Chief of Police Gauvreau, of Rimouski, Detective Denis, of the provincial police, and Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard, and closely guarded they were immediately driven to the provincial police station at the Parliament House and incarcerated there for the rest of the night.

Prisoners Are Haggard.

The prisoners appeared haggard. Crippen wore clerical clothes of Anglican cut, spectacles and a short beard. The two prisoners will appear before the police magistrate tomorrow morning. Dr. Crippen will probably be rushed back to London to stand his trial. The return will probably be on the Royal George, which leaves Quebec on Aug. 4. This would probably set the couple in London in time for the hearing to Aug. 15. The London authorities wish to avoid another postponement.

May Be Deported.

London, July 31.—Scotland Yard officials tonight did not have any exact information as to whether Crippen would be deported or extradited, but they expect deportation, in which case, it was stated, Crippen would be placed on trial within three weeks. So that there might be no delay the officials made arrangements today for the prompt dispatch to Quebec of Sergeant Mitchell, should that be necessary.

Was Woman Hypnotized?

Ethel Leneve's relatives tonight are relieved that their long suspense is ended. They are convinced now that the woman can prove her innocence. Her mother says she is certain that Crippen hypnotized her daughter, otherwise she would never have donned boy's dress.

NO TROUBLE WITH ENGINEERS SAY GRAND TRUNK OFFICIALS

A New Schedule of Wages Is Being Drawn Up—A Conference With the Men Is Likely to Be Held—Strike Could Not Take Place Inside of Six Weeks.

Grand Trunk officials stated positively to The Advertiser last night that no trouble is likely to take place between the company and their engineers. For several days there have been many rumors that the engineers would go out today in sympathy with the other men who are out.

"A new schedule is being drawn up now," said one official, "and will be submitted to the men as soon as possible. If they do not agree to it there will be a conference, probably, to adjust matters, and in any case there would have to be arbitration before the men could go out. The engineers could not declare a strike in less than six weeks."

NO PLACE PROVIDED FOR SPECIALS TO SLEEP

Grand Trunk Constables Felt Sore When They Arrived in London.

A party of special constables who came up from Toronto yesterday to do picket duty on the Grand Trunk Railway, and who were placed on guard at different points, were greatly displeased last night when they discovered that no provision had been made for their sleeping accommodation. They looked all about but the only place they could find was the waiting room. It was stated that the men went to hotels looking for accommodation, and could find none. The company still has men out night and day guarding every mile of track in the district.

FORMER LONDONER IN THRILLING RUNAWAY

Dr. English and Family Have Miraculous Escape From Serious Accident.

Hamilton, July 31.—Bolling as the gate of an incline car was raised, a horse, driven by Dr. English, superintendent of the insane asylum here, who was taking his wife and family to church, ran away this morning from the foot of James street, and was not stopped until it reached the bay. In its mad dash the animal raced across railway tracks leading to the T. H. and B. depots, over street railway tracks and through church-going crowds, who expected every minute to see the occupants of the buggy dashed out. The doctor pluckily hung on to the lines, but could not get control of the animal until it exhausted itself. His family clung to their seats, and although they were not injured, they were badly frightened. Right at the head of James street, there is a sharp curve, and the buggy came within an ace of toppling over and crashing against a telegraph pole.

The road from the mountain to James street is paved and Dr. English believes this was alone responsible for the family's fortunate escape.

Dr. English formerly practiced in this city, and took a prominent part in public affairs, being at various times on the board of education and hospital commission.

WOLSELEY BARRACKS MEN ORDERED FOR STRIKE DUTY AT FORT ERIE

Twenty Men From London Joined by Detachment From Toronto at Hamilton—Grand Trunk Will Commence the Moving of Freight at Fort Erie Today—Local Strikers Look for a Settlement by Tuesday

Rumors of the most sensational character went around the city last night when a detachment of twenty soldiers from Wolseley Barracks, in command of Lieut. Griffiths and Lieut. Chrysler, marched at the double to the Grand Trunk station, and arrived just in time to board the Eastern Flyer before she pulled out at 6:50. The men were fully armed and carried their whole military kit as they would on active service.

The men were ordered to Fort Erie and were joined at Hamilton last night by a large detachment from Stanley Barracks, Toronto. The Grand Trunk will commence moving freight at Fort Erie today, and fearing trouble asked for protection, which was promptly furnished. The men at Wolseley Barracks, it is said, were only given fifteen minutes in which to pack up and get ready.

Wild Rumors.

When they were seen hurrying to the G. T. R. station the wildest rumors flew about. One story was that a mob had made an attack at Niagara Falls and was burning cars and buildings. Another story had it that another attack had been made on G. T. R. employees at Belleville.

There was also a story that a train had been wrecked, that the men from Wolseley Barracks were called out to guard it, and that the 7th was to be sent as soon as it could be got together. Inquiry at the Grand Trunk offices, however, showed that all was quiet along the line. Superintendent Bowker stated that there had not been any trouble of any kind reported through the day and that passenger trains were moving freely.

"If the strike is settled and the men want to they can come back at any time," said an official last night to The Advertiser.

STILL CONFERRING OVER STRIKE SETTLEMENT A FEW HOURS OFF

Leaders of Trainmen and Grand Trunk Officials Held Several Conferences Sunday at Montreal and Feeling of Peace Is In the Air

An Arrest Made in the Enos Case

Chatham, July 31.—James Johnson, the negro wanted as an accessory to the murder of Jacob Enos, on the night of July 18, in this city, was arrested at noon Saturday in Windsor, and was brought here the same day.

The jury at the inquest on Enos brought in a verdict Saturday morning of murder, and that Frank Jackson, colored, shot Enos, and that James Johnson, also colored, was an accessory to the crime. The only evidence

taken at the inquest was that of Cassie Vincent and Louise Lewis, both colored, who skipped to Windsor after they had been subpoenaed to appear as witnesses, but were arrested there and brought back. Their evidence corroborated evidence of the preceding witnesses, but the crown is inclined to think that they had something back.

Crown Attorney Smith will go ahead at once with extradition proceedings to get Jackson from Detroit to stand trial for the murder.

POLE MADE THREATS AGAINST COUPLE'S LIVES

A Nelson Street Man Created a Lively Row on Saturday Evening.

Somebody telephone the police on Saturday evening about 10 o'clock that there was a riot going on in the house of William Wildchek, a Pole, who lives on Nelson street. The police wagon, with Sergeant McDonald and P. C. Marshall, went down as fast as the horses could run it and the officers found a worthy man raging that could be heard all around the neighborhood.

Wildchek explained to the police as well as he could that he was afraid to go to bed because one of the Poles who boarded with him had told Mrs.

Wildchek that he was going to kill both her and her husband, while they were asleep. The arrival of the police, however, effectually quelled the affair, and no more was heard of the trouble.

LONDON TP. FARMER DROPPED DEAD IN FIELD

Very Sudden Death of Mr. John McLennan, of Lot 4, Concession C.

John McLennan, of lot 4, concession C, of London Township, dropped dead Saturday afternoon while on his way in from his fields, where he was looking over his crops. He had just reached the gateway of his home and fell. Neighbors who saw him fall rushed to his assistance and carried him to the house, but before he arrived there he was dead. Dr. Stevenson was sent for, but nothing could be done.

Mrs. McLennan had gone to the city, to market, and on returning was greatly shocked to find her husband dead. Mr. McLennan was 59 years old, and came to this country from Scotland and settled on the Gore of London. Beside his wife, Mr. McLennan leaves two sons and two daughters. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon to the Gore Cemetery.

TOOK HIM FROM TRAIN
