BIG BUTTERFLY FARM

A Nursery of 40,000 Caterpillars Kent County, England.

London, April 29.-The prosperou butterfly and moth farm, not only breeding those insects by the tens of thousands, but also raising a large proportion of its own fodder plants and issuing its periodical price lists of eggs, larvae, pupae, and perfect in sects, is the natural outcome of popular turning to nature study and the increasing numbers of collectors. Such a farm was inaugurated a few years ago at Bexley, Kent, by Mr. L. W. Newman, F. E. S., and the venture has proved a great success.




