## AN ELOQUENT APPEAL FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

## Archdeacon Madden, of Liverpool in St. Paul's Cathedral.

Sunday morning in St. Paul's Cathedral, Archdeacon T. J. Madden, of Liverpool, England, delivered an eloquent appeal for Christian unity. The text of his sermon was the third verse of the fourth chapter of Ephesians, "Endeavoring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace."
"Christian unity." declared the archdeacon, "is probably the most popular religious topic in England today.' The English movement for the reunion of the divided sects of Christianity may be said to have had its beginning in the meeting of the Pan-Anglican Congress three years ago, At the Lambeth Coference, which followed, Dean Robinson, of Westminster, spoke in favor of the movement, and further developments took place. Since then all over England, churchmen and non-conformists have met together to discuss the points which they agree or disagree, and negotiations have also been made with the Lutheran church in Germany and the Presbyterian movement in Australia. But unity is not to be arrived at today or tomorrow. Three things are first required, namely, penitence (for the intolerance and errors of the past), and patience and prayer. God in his own time will bring about the consummation of unity in the churches and in the hearts and lives of men. The Evangelical Alliance aims the alliance of Christian peoples, the federation of Christian churches, and ultimately their reunion into one great Let

Catholic church. The alliance is also one of Christian faith and evangelical truth. "The Let deity of Christ is today being attacked by the followers of the new theology and other bizarre beliefs," said Archdeacon Madden. "If we eliminate the Godhead in Christ we have a body without a soul. Christ was very God and very man, and we believe in the Set atonement which he made for our sins. Just For Today" May Be Composition of Man Now in the Kingston Penitentiary.

## HAS SUBMITTED PROOF

Former Evangelist Is Serving Seven Years For Obtaining Money Under False Pretences at Hamilton.

Toronto, Oct. 10.-To appear for many years in Anglican hymn books, including Hymns, Ancient and Modern, and the new Canadian Hymn Book, with the word "anonymous" beneath it because the authorship was unknown, to become endeared to the hearts of scores of thousands thought the name of the man or woman who wrote it would never be known and to prove so popular that several composers have set it to music as a sacred song, only to have its real authorship disclosed through a letter from a convict in Kingston Penitentiary, may develop to be the fate of the beautiful hymn, "Just for Today." The Archbishop of Ottawa received a letter a few days ago which was of such a character and made such claims that the matter will be investigated by the committee which compiled the new Anglican hymn book.

Looking Into the Claims. The archbishop, who was a member of that committee, forwarded the letter to J. Edmund Jones, of ronto, who is taking steps to look into the claims. The man who seeks step into the breach heretofore bridged by the word "anonymous" is Wil-Huckle, formerly of London, England, later of Hamilton, Ontario and now in the penitentiary at Kings-

Huckle urges as his reason for writing that if the composition is worthy of a place in the sacred book the authorship should be acknowledged when that authorship is or can be known. But the convict does not end with a mere claim to the fathering of the stanzas, for he knew that scant attention would be paid to unsubstantiated claims. 

## **CURE FOR DISEASE** Very rarely, however, is there anything nowadays that might be termed Patients in English Hospital Are

## Suspended By Neck at End of Rope. London, Oct. 10.-Hanging from the

neck by a rope has become a recognized form of treatment for certain nervous diseases at the National Hospital for the paralyzed and epileptic in Bloomsbury. In wryneck, in particular, this hanging is said to have given results, certain cases totally unrelieved by other more conservative methods of treatment responding well to this strenuous cure. The apparatus used consists of a metal ripod eight feet in height, with a pulley at the top. Over this pullex is passed a rope attached to two large metal stirrups, well padded with leather, one of which fits beneath the patient's chin and the other beneath the protruding part of the head. The principle of the treatment is that the weight of the patient's body is used to stretch the contracted neck and muscles, which cause the head to be

"We begin the treatment," said one of the hospital staff in explaining it, "by gently pulling the free end of the rope until the patient is raised on his toes. After being kept in this position for a few seconds he is given a few moments' young victim, who succumbed to his

est. The second time he is raised a little higher, so that more strain falls on the neck's muscles. The process is continued every morning for a fortnight, the dose being gradually increased until toward the end of the treatment the patient can stand being suspended clear of the ground for twenty or thirty seconds. 'Immediately after each morning's

treatment the patient is at once put back to bed, where he stays until the next morning's treatment. While this hanging cure has given good results in certain cases, it must not be understood that we treat all wrynecks in this way."
