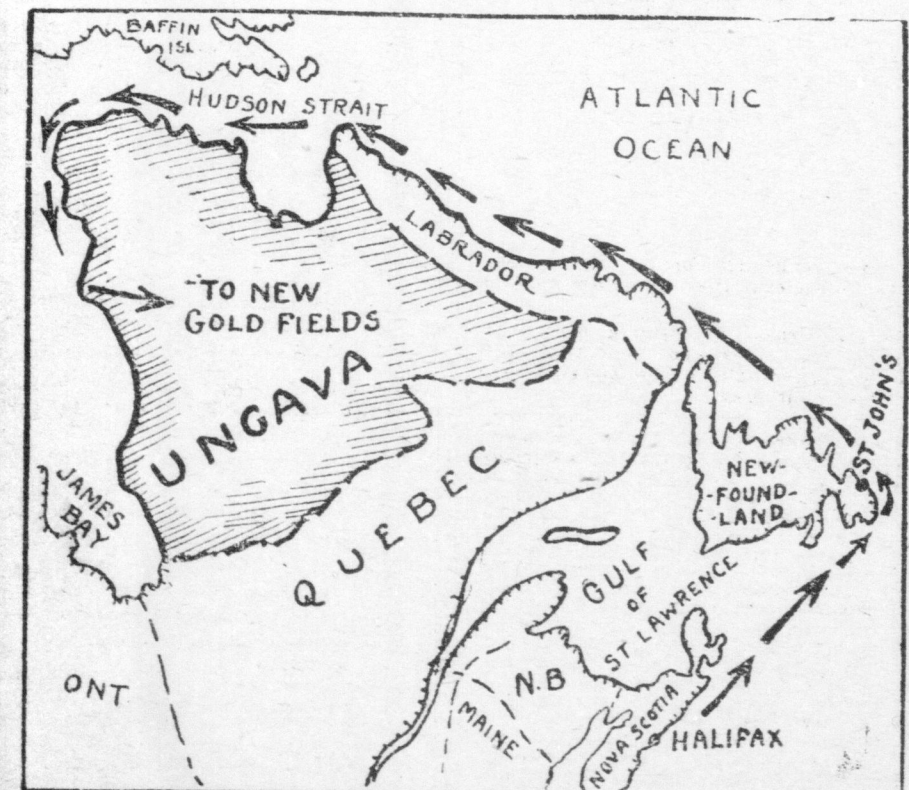

ONE DAY OFF FOR POLICE OF LONDON

Agitation to Have Conditions in This City Bettered.

The city police will attempt shortly to prevail upon the police commission to grant one day off in every seven, and the members of the department at present work every day in the year with the exception of two weeks' holidays granted each in the summer months.

The men assert that the only relief from the monotony of their work is when the shift is made from night to day, or from one beat to another. In order to grant their wishes half a dozen men would have to be added to the police force.

ASKIN ST. CHURCH REVIVAL SERVICES

Rev. Mr. Harvey Preached on Friday Night.

The large schoolroom of the Askin Street Church was well filled Friday night by a deeply interested audience, the occasion being the last of a series of revival services which have been carried on for the past two weeks. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Harvey, conducted the service and preached an earnest and impressive sermon from the text, "Will Ye Also Go Away?" These meetings have proved so helpful to the church that there is a strong feeling that they should be continued for another week at least. CHECK NOT SIGNED SAYS MR. POCKOCK

Chairman of Water Board Makes an Explanation.

Chairman Pockock, of the water commission, takes exception to the printed reports of the board's refusal to sign a check for \$5 for membership in the London Motor League for General Manager Glaubitz. He declares that he was done an injustice.

"It is erroneous to say that the check was issued, and cashed," he told The Advertiser. "Neither myself nor the mayor signed the check. What did happen was that the bill was presented, signed by Mr. Glaubitz, and paid out of cash on hand, as many small accounts are every day. These bills are afterwards brought to the water commissioners' gone through, and if satisfactory, the checks are issued, and they act as vouchers for the amount so paid.

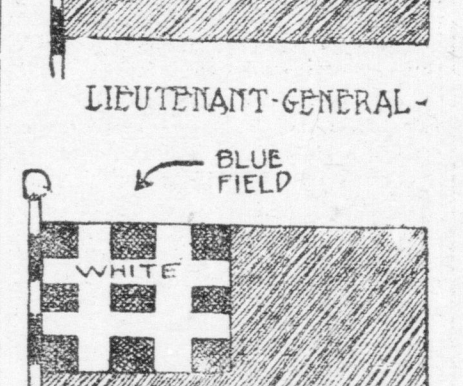
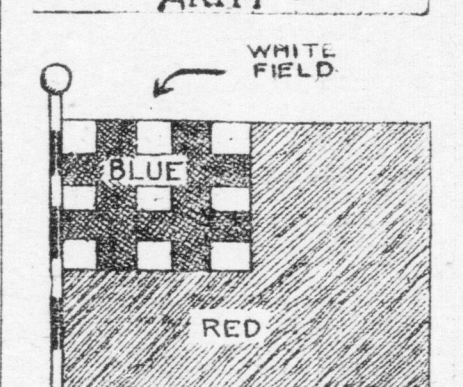
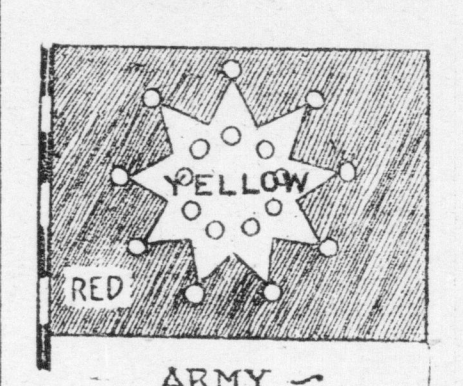
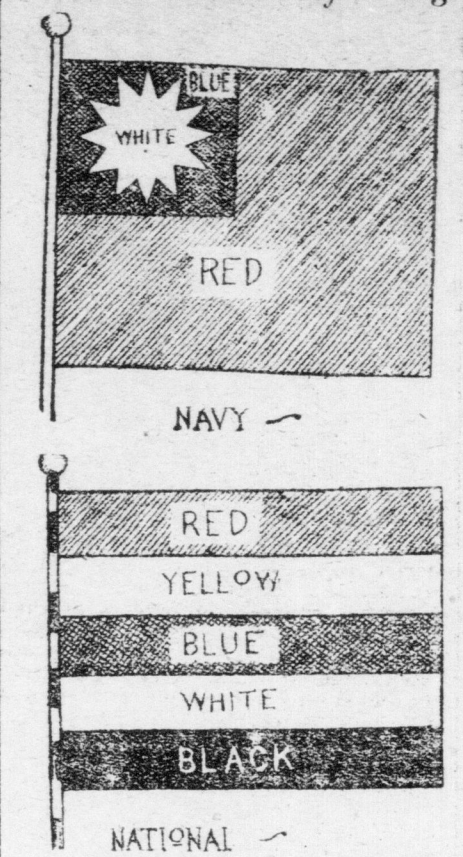
"In this case the money was paid to the London Motor League out of the cash account. When the account came to us at the meeting, it was promptly refused payment. It was I myself who called attention to this fact, and I refused to pass it.

"I did not think, nor do I now think, that the city should pay the account. But make no mistake, there are many good reasons why Mr. Glaubitz should become a member of the organization. As it was pointed out by one of the members of the organization, the car, not the man, should belong, and as the car belonged to the city, the water commissioners should pay the cost. Nevertheless, I did not deem it right to pay this account. I am not reflecting on Mr. Glaubitz. He paid \$10 membership fee to the London Curling Club to get their contract for lighting, and he never curd. The commissioners did not pay this fee either. The London Motor Club fee is a very trivial matter, and altogether too much has been made of it."

COLBORNE ST. METHODISTS VOTE FOR CHURCH UNION

Congregation Stand About 3 to 1 in Favor of the Proposal.

The members and adherents of the Colborne Street Methodist Church are strong in favor of church union, according to the figures just made public by the pastor, Rev. D. N. McCamus.

The action is about 3 to 1 in favor of uniting with the Presbyterian, Congregational and Methodist Churches. Of the 520 members on the roll, over 18 years of age, 235 were in favor, 19 against. Twenty-four members under 18 years of age favored union, while 12 opposed it. There were 169 members who did not vote.

Of the adherents, 84 were favorable to union, with 15 against it. Fifty-five adherents did not vote. Of the 40 members of the official board, 22 cast ballots for union, while 12 were in opposition. Six of the members did not vote.

Altogether there were 365 votes cast in favor of the scheme, with 120 against it.
