

ELECTIVE SENATE FOR THE IRISH

London, Oct. 31.—The Government offered its amendment to the home rule bill providing for election of members for the Irish Senate according to proportional representation schemes in the House of Commons tonight. The members of the first senate are to be appointed by the Government. Introducing the amendment, Augustus Birrell, the chief secretary for Ireland, intimated that it was intended as an additional safeguard and defence against the objections of the Unionists. The debate on the amendment then began.

Ramsay MacDonald, the Socialist and Labor leader, astonished the House by asserting that though he was utterly opposed to proportional representation he was prepared to allow the experiment to be tried on the Irish Senate because Ireland, he said, "represented a low form of social organization."

Bona Law, the Opposition leader, opposed the amendment on the ground that it was utterly valueless as a safeguard.

John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, gave the amendment lukewarm support. He said he preferred a nominated senate, but as long as the nomination idea was to be maintained for the first critical five years he would support it.

The amendment was carried by a vote of 293 to 209.

M'NAMARA PLOT TO "GET" WM. BURNS DETECTIVE CHARGES

Chief Dynamiter, in Prison, Endeavored To Have the Hated Man Killed.

WITNESS AT TRIAL TELLS STRANGE TALE

Infernal Machine Intended For Killing Said To Have Passed Through Hockin's Hands.

Indianapolis, Oct. 31.—That J. J. McNamara, since he has been confined in San Quentin prison in California, has been plotting to "get" William J. Burns and Walter Drev, of the National Erectors' Association, was the subject of testimony given this afternoon by Edward J. Brennan, a Government agent, at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial. Brennan testified Hockin stated he (Hockin) had visited McNamara in San Quentin this year and that McNamara had said: "I would like to see them get Burns and Drev."

What McNamara Said. Another statement which Brennan said Hockin made to him was that Olaf A. Tveitmo, Anton Johansson, Theodore Yoell, president of the Asiatic Exclusion League, and a man named Lewis talked with Hockin about what McNamara had said.

When Hockin was going to the station to return to Indianapolis, Tveitmo, Johansson, Lewis and Yoell accompanied him, Johansson saying on the way: "Mac (meaning McNamara) is anxious for them to get Drev and Burns." Johansson then added to Hockin: "After you return to Indianapolis a strange man will appear on the scene. You will know him when he says, 'I am Arrow, Shot Darrow.' When he says those words to you, you will know he is the right man."

"Arrow" Brought Package. "Hockin did return to Indianapolis," said the witness, "and a short time later he was called on the telephone by a man, who said: 'I am Arrow, not Darrow.' Later he met the stranger and proceeded to open the package of him. The man brought a package, which he left at the ironworkers' headquarters."

A few days later Walter Davis, a member of a local ironworkers' union in New York city, came in. Hockin gave him the package, saying, "Take that out of here, and get rid of it." Davis returned with a check from the Union station. Hockin then took the check to District Attorney Miller. Later Fred Sherman, an ironworker, who is on trial, came in and asked for the check. Hockin pretended he had lost it. Another Arrow, Sherman, returned and said, "Say, that man says you're a liar and a crook, meaning Hockin had not lost the check."

Brennan testified that he was all Hockin said he knew about it. United States Marshal Edward H. Schmidt was called upon to produce the package referred to in Brennan's testimony. Schmidt opened the package, identified the fuse, dynamite caps, alarm clock, and the date of the newspaper in which they were wrapped. He said the check for the package had been delivered to him by District Attorney Miller.

TURK GOVT. DENIES STORIES OF MASSACRES

Replies to Bulgarian Charges of Unexampled Atrocities.

London, Oct. 31.—The Serbian legation has received a dispatch from Belgrade giving accounts by returned Serbian officers of atrocities committed by the Turkish troops before abandoning the country conquered by the Serbians.

"Wherever the Turks passed," says the dispatch, "the Serbian army found only land strewn with bodies of men, women and children, mutilated in the most barbarous fashion. Bodies of men were also found buried in trees. They had been burned alive by means of fires kindled under their feet. One body bore indications of having been roasted on a gridiron."

Bulgarians Report Atrocities. Sofia, Oct. 31.—The Bulgarian army is vigorously pursuing the Turks, who are retreating in disorder and panic on Serai and Tchorul. Many guns and large quantities of ammunition have been captured. Aivali, near Lule Burgas, and Maras, have been burned. All the Christian inhabitants, according to the Bulgarians, were massacred.

Canea, Crete, Oct. 31.—The British armored cruiser Hampshire sailed from here today for Saloniki.

Turkey Denies. Vienna, Oct. 31.—The Turkish foreign minister, Noradunghian, declares that the apprehensions concerning the massacres of Christians in Constantinople and Saloniki are absolutely unfounded. Excitement in Turkey is not directed against the Christians. The Turkish Government has taken energetic measures to prevent trouble in European and Asiatic Turkey.

TURNING MOVEMENT FOOLED THE TURKS

Nazim Pasha, the Sultan's Commander, Was Completely Outmanoeuvred.

Sofia, Oct. 31.—News of the defeat of the Turkish army was received here late tonight with a feeling of great relief, but no noisy demonstration. Confidence in the success of the Bulgarian army had been mixed with great anxiety because of the lack of news for the last two days.

The people are now looking forward to Bulgaria becoming a great power in the Balkans, as Turkey formerly was.

It is understood that the fighting has been of the fiercest character, even night affording no intermission. The Turks suffered severely. Many were captured and great numbers of dead were left on the field. Little has been heard from the Bulgarian left wing, which stretched from Bunarhisza to Midia. In this territory the Turks greatly outnumbered the Bulgarians, who have been only just able to hold their own. Any slight success which the Turks obtained here, however, was of no material importance.

Completely Fooled Turks. In the meantime the Bulgarians were due to superior strategy, combined with the extreme energy of their offensive movement. It appears that the object of the rapid advance early in the week on Viza and Midia was not really to outflank the Turkish right, but to mislead the Turks. This was entirely successful. The Turks moved their reserves by sea and along the coast to strengthen the right wing, which reached to Istanbula, and directed all their efforts to meeting here what they believed to be the main attack.

In the meantime the Bulgarians were really concentrating at Eskibazas, which is a strategic point, and by convergent roads from before movement. It appears that the Bulgarians' main force, on their right wing, was thus superior in strength to the Turks at Lule Burgas and was able to hurl them back.

It is believed that the total Turkish force numbered 250,000, as compared with 150,000 Bulgarians, the latter being obliged to leave many men around Adrianople. Probably the decisive movement on the Bulgarian right was one through Atrokol, 15 miles to the south of Balka, which turned the Turkish flank. The Turkish reserves west of Yenikent, nine divisions strong, were pushed forward towards the centre of the Turkish line to check the Bulgarian advance, but it is believed that these reserves are also in retreat.
