BOARD ASK MORE MONEY FROM CITY
School Trustees Will Require Big Sum to Meet Expenses of Present Year.

The board of education will ask the city council for \$275,102.17 to operate the public schools, Collegiate Institute and London Art and Industrial School this year. This was the amount of the estimates passed upon by the trustees yesterday. The sum of \$229,194.11 is for public school purposes, \$41,477.61 for the Collegiate Institute and \$4,430.45 for the industrial school.

The whole proposed expenditure shows an increase over last year of approximately \$29,000 which is made up largely of interest and sinking fund on debentures, and salaries of extra teachers. The last item, alone, amounts to \$11,000. The increases to various classes of instructors also do their share toward swelling the extra expenditure.

The big expense at the Collegiate comes in \$45,000 for teachers' salaries, \$1,400 for fuel, \$1,000 for examinations and \$2,100 for janitors' expenses. Receipts are estimated at \$15,814.37, including \$1,400 for non-resident fees, \$1,500 for resident fees, \$1,500 in Government grants and \$300 from non-resident pupils amount to \$12,755. In the estimate, \$33,189.92 is allowed for sinking fund and interest.

Art School Estimates Lower.
The art and industrial school estimates are, in fact, lower to the extent of \$146.45 than last year. This year, the estimate is \$8,431.93, whereas the figure in 1913 was \$8,578.30.

The trustees decided to appoint two brothers, W. J. and J. B. Pengelly, at present students at Guelph, as training instructors. They will receive \$1,200 a year, each, with a yearly increase of \$100 until a maximum deemed suitable by the board is reached.

Request for Power to Make Contracts With Municipalities Given Hearing.
Mayor C. M. R. Graham returned last night from Toronto, where he attended the conference between the executive of the Ontario Radicals Union and the members of the Ontario cabinet.

"I was greatly pleased with the conference," said his worship with the telephone to The Advertiser, "and certainly a wonderful interest is being shown all over the Province in the radicals project, there being about 225 present. We asked the cabinet for legislation to make it possible for the Ontario Hydro Commission to make contracts with the various municipalities to guarantee bonds for the construction of the roads, and the request was most favorably received. While they did not promise us definitely I have no doubt but that the legislation will be forthcoming at the present session."

"The Legislature has received no word as yet from the Federal Government as to the latter's intention in assisting Ontario radicals, but I anticipate that the Ontario authorities, as well as the Canadian Government, will be prepared to assist us in the project."

WILL FORM A CAMERA CLUB
Snapshot Enthusiasts Start Organization Proceedings.

At a well attended meeting, held last evening, steps were taken to inaugurate a London camera club, and it is expected that at another gathering to be held shortly organization will take place. Considerable enthusiasm was shown in the matter, and it was predicted that London will soon have a camera club, which will have several hundred young men and women as members. Prizes will be offered for special work and experts will be secured to give practical talks and demonstrations.

FORMER LONDONER DEAD IN WINNIPEG
[Special to The Advertiser.]
Winnipeg, Man., April 1.—Duncan Sinclair, one of the best-known lumbmen in Winnipeg, for years chairman of the school board, and prominent in Presbyterian Church circles, died today after a lingering illness, aged 65. Born in Scotland, he came to Canada in 1855, settling in London, Ont., district, with his parents, where he remained until 1882, when he removed to Winnipeg. Two of his sons are officers in Winnipeg Cameron Highlanders.

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UPHOLDS DRAYMEN IN FIGHT WITH CITY
Trades and Labor Council Will Assist in Obtaining Former Stand.

Members of the local Trades and Labor Council will record last night to give their unanimous support to the draymen in their fight to return to the old York street stand, and ordered that a communication be forwarded to the board of control asking that body to allow the draymen to return to their former place of business.

The T. and L. Council members without an exception stated that they could not understand the attitude of the York street wholesale houses against the draymen, as the express companies' horses and hacks, cabs, etc., stood at the back of the Grand Trunk station every day.

Joseph Marks, publisher of the Industrial Banner, stated that he did intend to apologize for running pictures of certain local citizens in the Christmas issue of the Banner, and that if the members of the council who had criticized him for doing so were acquainted with the sanctum of a newspaper office they would not have done so.

The Banner has never sold out to any politician and has always supported labor candidates, and will continue to do so," concluded Mr. Marks.

William Stokes, of the Trades and Labor Council, addressed the London members for a few minutes, asking that London labor men send as large a delegation as possible to the Labor Educational Association convention, which will be held in the railroad city on May 24th.

A communication was received from the Hamilton Trades and Labor Council asking that the local branch report to them the true labor conditions here in order that they could be forwarded to the British papers to show immigrants the real condition of labor affairs in this country.

President James Hussey occupied the chair.

ROAD CONDITIONS ARE BETTER THAN YEAR AGO
Farmers Declare That County Thoroughfares Only Need Good Warm Rain.

Middlesex county roads, while in a more or less bad condition at the present time, are said to be far ahead of what they were at this time last year, and the worst is over for this in the opinion of many. A farmer residing in the vicinity of London informed the Advertiser yesterday that a good warm rain would put the roads in that vicinity in good shape, because it would wash off a lot of the surface mud and start the drains running well.

The high winds of the last few days have done much towards drying up the roads, and a few days of warm sunshine should put them in good shape for the summer.

LIBERALS PLAY EUCHRE
Downtown Club and South End Branch Hold Interesting Drive.

The members of the London Liberal Club and the South London branch held an interesting euchre drive in Hyman Hall last night. The first prize, a pipe donated by the club, was won by Samuel Sleeman, and the second prize, also a pipe, given by W. J. Clark, was secured by John Lamey. There were about 75 in attendance and the evening's entertainment was thoroughly enjoyable.

TO INSPECT MARKET SITE
Controllers Will Act at last on East London's Request.

This afternoon the board of control will make a trip to the east end to inspect a market site which has been offered for a branch market. This matter has been hanging fire for a couple of years, and although east end residents have offered to subscribe several hundred dollars in cash to assist the project, comparatively nothing so far has been done to bring the matter to a head. William Hayman, William Wakeling and other east-enders who are interested in the project will meet the controllers on Thursday afternoon and go over the ground with them.

At the same time that the east end market proposition is being considered, the board will probably take up the question of paving Covent Garden market. Estimates have been prepared of the cost of this work, and it is considered very necessary.

COMMANDER EVANS THRILLS AUDIENCE
Tells Graphic Story of Scott Dash For South Pole.

TRIBUTES TO THE LEADER
Heroic Band of Explorers Extolled in Simple Forceful Language.

"Their motto was 'Play the game.'" Such were the closing words of Commander Evans' lecture in the Grand Opera House Wednesday evening on "Captain Scott's Last Expedition." No more fitting tribute could possibly be paid to the gallant little band of Britons, the story of whose glorious achievement and tragic end thrilled an audience which completely filled the theatre.

Told in the language of Commander Evans, in terse, simple phrases, without any unnecessary comment, the story was an epic such as the world seldom hears. Splendid Views. Added to this there were the pictures. It is perfectly safe to say that nothing ever approaching them in interest have been seen in this city. Many of them were taken by Dr. E. A. Wilson, the personal friend of Captain Scott, who was one of the five to perish with him. They formed a complete record of the expedition from the time it left London in 1910 until the final return journey from the pole was begun. The pictures were a story in themselves—a story without words—and the audience accorded enthusiastic applause to many of the slides shown. A journey which took the members of the expedition three years to complete amidst almost unbelievable hardships the pictures made possible for a London audience to take in two hours, seated comfortably in a theatre.

"These Were Men." Commander Evans is a lecturer par excellence. Athletic and clean-cut in appearance, his style of narrative is convincing to the last degree, and he held the interest of his audience right through. A subtle vein of humor running all through his remarks relieved to a large extent the intensity of the story which was his to tell. To attempt to re-tell in any but his own words, would be but to mar it. The narration of the conduct of the sixty members of the expedition during the trying three years in which they were absent from civilization awakened in the minds of those who heard it, the thought: "These were men."

Not once was there the semblance of a quarrel, the members each working for the good of all the other members of the expedition. In the greatest good humor they went about their labors, beguiling the long stormy nights with songs and stories of home, and reading at times from Dickens' "David Copperfield" and "Pickwick Papers."

The Last Struggle.
A sympathetic hush fell upon the audience while Commander Evans told of the last struggles of Captain Scott and his brave comrades, and the memorable last entry in the diary: "These rough notes and our bodies must tell the tale."

The lecturer was loudly cheered at the conclusion of the story, in the acting of which he bore no inconsiderable part as second in command of the expedition. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded him, moved by Very Rev. Dean Davis, and conveyed to him in a neat speech by Col. Hodgins, who acted as chairman and introduced the speaker. The Ladies' Guild of St. James Church, who brought Commander Evans to this city, were congratulated upon the success of the undertaking.
