**WOMAN LOST IN WOODS TWO DAYS AND NIGHTS**  
Driven Nearly Insane by Fear—Boots Torn Off and Clothes in Ribbons.

HALIFAX, May 3.—Alone in the woods for two days and nights and nearly driven insane by fear, were the experiences suffered by Mrs. Owen, aged 60, when she tried to walk from Windsor Junction, N. S., to the home of some friends near Sackville, N. S. Mrs. Owen belongs to Maple Grove, Hantsport, N. S.

After walking five or six miles from the railway station at Windsor Junction on Thursday, Mrs. Owen strayed off the track, and during the night got lost in the forest. Without sleep, she wandered around, falling into a pond and getting out with difficulty. Her boots were torn from her feet, while her clothes were torn to ribbons.

### INSTALLS MODERN FREEZING PLANT

Another modern plant has been added to London's already large number of well-equipped business places. It is a plant for making ice cream without the use of ice either artificial or natural and has been installed by Mr. J. W. Griffiths, proprietor of the City Creamery Company. It is the first plant of its kind to be installed in Western Ontario and is operated entirely by electricity. When Mr. Griffiths touched a switch in his plant Thursday afternoon and started the machinery in motion he added another link in the modern industrial chain of this city.

The plant can be used for many purposes, but its main output during the summer months will be ice cream. Ten gallons of the favorite delicacy of Londoners can be turned out every fifteen minutes. Added to this is the fact that it is made under the most sanitary conditions, not being touched by hand from the time the milk is taken from a herd on the farm until the consumer places it upon the table.

Mr. Griffiths is now making arrangements to sell the ice cream wholesale and will supply the small stores of Western Ontario, as well as the homes of London.

The plant has also an arrangement for circulating the cooling fluid through the refrigerator where the milk, butter, buttermilk and cream, other products of the City Creamery, are kept, which keeps them cool and fresh even in the hottest weather.

"I visited several large American cities in search of a modern plant," said Mr. Griffiths to the Advertiser. "But did not find what I wanted until I reached Chicago, where I found a duplicate of this system in one of the largest creameries there."

ST. DAVID'S, ANGLICAN.

St. David's Anglican Church, Hamilton road and Hyla street, was built five years ago, by the Rev. T. B. Clarke, rector of All Saints Church, as a mission church.

Rev. David Williams, bishop of Huron, and the rector, Mr. Clarke, were born, and baptized and taught together, in the little parish of St. David's, in South Wales. St. David's in East London, was named after St. David's in Wales.

For the first four months, Mr. Clarke took charge of the church he had built, preached sermons there, and also in All Saints. He found it necessary to find help, for the church grew wonderfully, proving that it was needed from the first. W. I. James, who has since been ordained, was the first assistant in St. David's. Since then there have been three other assistants, and a year ago, the Rev. S. E. McKegney, a young Irishman, was given the post. He is regarded as an exceptionally fluent preacher, and besides, he is witty, a true Irishman.

**Building Enlarged.**  
East London has grown rapidly in the last few years, that it was not long before the little mission was packed every Sunday. One year ago Christmas the building was enlarged, and holds a present about 400. Recently the members have held meetings to discuss the further enlargement of the church, and they expect to build a large brick church, for its finances are in excellent shape, and the congregation is loyal, and deeply interested in the welfare of its church.

### MOTHER'S INFLUENCE GREAT, SAYS RECTOR

Is a Magical Power in Shaping Lives of Mankind—A Choice of Great Men.

The 19th chapter of St. John, 10th verse, "And I fell at His feet to worship," was the text of Rev. R. W. Norwood, of the Cronyn Memorial Church, last night. Mr. Norwood drew a vivid picture of the wonderful voices and mysteries that enshroud the incarnate life in our childhood.

"It is hard to realize, and even St. Paul himself does not quite bring up the portrait of Jesus to our mind as he might," he said.

"We are inclined to adore people greater than ourselves. When we feel despondent God often sends us a man's mother to brighten us up and improve our outlook on the world, and we are very grateful to this angel of the earth. The angel does not always speak to us by word of mouth. He may come as a picture, song or book."

He stated that a mother was the dearest angel on earth, and that when inclined to be tempted by the face of a man's mother often restrained him. The old heroes of our boyhood and girlhood give life its significance. We receive a great deal of patriotism from these statesmen and patriots, and what joy has come to us through books of the reflections of these men.

He told the young men of the congregation to beware of worshipping one great man.

"It is wrong to take a standard and become impervious to others equally grand," he declared. "The difference between greatness and seeming greatness is that one gives all to the world while the other is a self admirer."

"All can be angels of greatness," he concluded. "The birth into the world, and say, 'It is mine,' and all victories shall be yours."

### MUSIC IS HEAVEN'S ART, SAYS PETROLEA PASTOR

Is Characteristic of Christian Worship, Says Rev. H. B. Moyer.

Rev. H. B. Moyer, of Petrolea, occupied the pulpit of Colborne Street Methodist Church at both services yesterday.

Last night he preached a strong sermon on "Music, Heaven's Highest Art." "The Puritans and Spartans looked upon music as a corrupting and debaucher of mind and body," he said. "In the divine revelation music was constantly referred to, as in Genesis we find:

"In the development of Hebrew religious life and worship song and music played an important part. David's orchestra and choir was the greatest religious musical organization up to that time."

Music is a characteristic of Christian worship. There may be a crude form of music used in pagan worship that, at its highest expresses yearning, but never the joy of assurance. Music is an art that cannot be corrupted. It is through music that the various Christian creeds come together as the hymn books of all denominations contain the hymns of men and

## LEGALIZED BAR IS POLITICAL MENACE

Rev. H. H. Bingham Denounces Traffic in Sunday Evening Sermon.

### HIGHWAY ROBBERS BETTER

Would Rather Have Them Than the Saloons, Says Pastor.

"I do not contend that the liquor traffic is responsible for all crime, nor that all men who drink are criminals. Every man who drinks is not a criminal, but it is true that most criminals are drinkers," declared Rev. H. H. Bingham, preaching on "Canada's Curse" in Talbot Street Baptist Church last evening.

In denouncing the traffic, Rev. Bingham did not censure personally, nor hotels, which, he stated, were essential and legitimate, but he denounced the bar as a blemish attached to the hotel.

"Today," he stated, "the saloon is a legalized business, and those who vote for its legalizing are responsible with the saloonkeeper."

Continuing, Rev. Bingham denounced the liquor traffic as the enemy of business, education, purity of home life, and all that is dear in modern civilization. "There was a time," averred the preacher, "when the only force against the traffic was religion, and that was apathetic, but that day is gone by. Today religion has been reinforced by all social and moral forces, by industrial and economic forces, and by men of medical science."

"The barroom is a barrier to all true progress of modern civilization. A 'boozer' is of little or no value in business, railroads, banks and great factories, having no use for men who drink. Labor organizations have denounced it at all great conventions regarding evils formed, out of results weakness of spirit and shattered nerves of their crime."

**70 Per Cent Prisoners Through Drink.**  
The provincial Government is spending a million and a quarter to establish a prison farm in Ontario to accommodate 600 prisoners, 70 per cent of whom, directly or indirectly, die there because drink is the cause of their crime."

"This is a political menace," asserted Rev. Bingham. "To legalize a traffic, and then spend millions to care for its protection, in prisons, orphan's homes and mental asylums. The traffic wrecks manhood, debauches politics, steals the virtue of women, reduces homes to poverty, no thief in all criminality having a record like the liquor evil."

"I would rather have so many highway robbers in a community than saloons," was the speaker's startling statement. The robber steals only money, but the liquor evil takes the money and robs the man of his character, home, social prestige, heaven and God."

"The license system is insufficient," said the speaker, "it breeds vice and bad government—high licenses does not lessen the evil. It is not reformation that is needed, and you cannot reform it as inherently wrong. The time has come not only to banish bars, but the breweries, too, must go."

**Curse to Physical Life.**  
"The traffic was denounced as a curse to moral and spiritual life, being unable to separate itself from the crimes of today, robbing a man of his will power, his spiritual aspirations and his soul."

"We hang the murderers it has manufactured, ostracized the barlits it has made, imprisoned the thieves, and yet retain

by our vote a traffic that has slain more men in one year in Canada than war has in 50 years."

## NEED PERSONAL TOUCH IN CHURCH WORK

Must Have It to Bring in the "Stay-Aways," Says Rev. J. H. Boyd.

Preaching the postponed anniversary sermon, in Adelaide Street Baptist Church yesterday morning, Rev. J. H. Boyd took as his subject, "The Pilgrims' Joy in the Lord's House," choosing the text, "I was glad when they said unto me: Let us go into the house of the Lord," as the basis of his remarks.

Rev. Mr. Boyd reminded his hearers that this was the third of the fifteen songs of degrees or steps, in the Pilgrim songs, said to have been sung by the thousands of pilgrims as they wended their way through the country up to the city, and house of the Lord.

Continuing, the preacher spoke of the psalmist's appreciation of the invitation to God's house, and said: "The human heart is hungering for God, wants to know God, and in 99 cases out of 100, appreciates an invitation to the house of the Lord."

"We make a great mistake when we think people do not appreciate an invitation to church." There is a large class who stay away, averred the speaker, because they have false notions of the church. They think they are not wanted, or if wanted, it is only for what they can give. All such notions are wrong. Paul said: "We want not yours, but you."

"The personal touch and the personal invitation is one of the greatest needs of the church and humanity at large," asserted Rev. Mr. Boyd.

In concluding, he said: "Our feet are standing within the gates of Jerusalem; there the redeemed of the Lord meet and enjoy sweet fellowship; the church is a type of the new Jerusalem. It is chosen; its foundation is the Rock of Ages; it has like Jerusalem of old, been taken out of the land of the enemy. The peace of prosperity rests upon God's house. Those who enter and love him shall prosper."

### CANNOT UNDERSTAND MISS ROBB'S ARREST

ST. THOMAS, May 3.—The news from Toronto of Miss Kathleen Robb's arrest for the alleged passing of worthless checks in that city was a great shock to the young lady's many friends here. Miss Robb, an extremely winsome girl, lived here with her parents until about six months ago, when she left for the Queen City to take an office position.

She was a genuine favorite with a host of young people, and was considered one of the city's prettiest and most accomplished girls. Her parents, who reside on Wellington street, are highly respected, Mr. Robb being connected with the immigration service of the Dominion Government.

They are at a loss to understand how Kathleen could possibly become entangled in an affair of this kind, unless she did not understand the enormity of such doings. It is hoped by her St. Thomas friends that the matter will be cleared up and that further investigation will show that no wrong was intentionally committed, but that she took this method of obtaining money for immediate use, intending to make the amounts good later.
