Paris, Nov. 28-12:30 p.m.-German and Bulgarian troops on the Macedonian front made four counterattacks last night in an effort to drive the Serbians from Hill 1050 in the Cerna River region, which was captured yesterday. The war office announces that these attacks failed with heavy losses.

The text reads as follows: "During the day of November 26 an attack, in which the Zouaves took a brilliant part, co-operating with Serbian troops in the region to the northeast of Monastir, made us masters of Hill 1050. In spite of his efforts the enemy did not succeed in dislodging us from this important position, which he had fortified strongly. Four counter-attacks by Germano-Bulgarian forces were successively repulsed by our troops, who inflicted sanguinary losses on the enemy
