The new parish house will be built through the co-operation of every member of the congregation and not solely by means of large donations from a few of the more prominent members as has been the case in similar instances in the past.

A club has been formed, with a membership of one thousand in view. Each member of the church joining this makes a minimum pledge of one dollar a month for ten months in the year (the holiday months of July and August being omitted) for five years, This will thsure \$50,000 in the course of five years, beginning April 1, 1926.


